The resulting damage has often been lessened by international co-operation and, at a local level, by the actions of strong communities like the Abingtons and Hildersham. From the Seven Churches

Happy New Year from our Ministry Team! By the time you are reading this, I hope you will have heard that we have appointed a new rector to replace Dr. Julie Norris to lead our group of seven churches (see page 6).

The Church of England has a complex system of appointing priests to new posts. At the very end of the process it is the final decision of our Diocesan Bishop, who appoints and licenses the new priest.

But before that, all our churchwardens, who are all 'Bishop's Officers' appointed by the Bishop of Ely, the Right Revd Stephen Conway, have the responsibility of selecting the new Rector.

In addition to that, every parish in the Church of England has a Patron who is also responsible for appointing the parish clergy. Our seven churches all have patrons who take their part in the appointment process, and they will be coming to the Installation Service to formally present the new Rector to the Bishop. As you can see, it is a complicated procedure.

Back to celebrating the New Year! On behalf of all the members of our ministry team, may God bless you and your loved ones in the year to come.

January 2018

Once again we begin a new year which some welcome and others dread. It is a chance to begin afresh. From all the festivities perhaps we can stop for a moment to remember them and reflect on days past and look forward with a thankful heart. We have hope that as we have celebrated Christmas we can make a difference to our neighbours and friends.

The area we live in is rural and we are aware, more than most, of the changing seasons as we see the tractors ploughing the fields. It is cold and the ground hard and yet this all helps the soil to be renewed ready to grow more crops. In the light of our dependence on the weather and the need to recognise those who go out in all winds and weathers Plough Sunday offers us a tradition that goes back over centuries. More recently it has been revived in Balsham. Plough Sunday celebrations usually involve bringing a ploughshare into a church with prayers for the blessing of the land. It is traditionally held on the Sunday after Epiphany, the Sunday between 7 January and 13 January. Accordingly, work in the fields did not begin until the day after Plough Sunday: Plough Monday marks the resumption of agricultural work after the Christmas festivities. In some areas of England it was common for the farm labourers to tour the villages with their plough in a money-raising trip. After the blessing, the plough was traditionally pulled through the village led by a Fool and a 'Betsy' (a boy dressed as a woman). The procession stopped at as many pubs and friendly houses as possible for revellers to demand drinks. Pennies were also collected along the route. Anyone not paying a penny was likely to find a furrow cut across their land by morning.

The Church's year has a rich pattern of tradition which helps us to be grounded. Come along and see. We'd love to welcome you.

On Friday 8 December an extraordinary first time event took place within the Granta Vale Benefice when interviews were held for a new vicar. This is the first time a vicar has been sought since the Benefice was formed. The day was planned in fine detail, with the three candidates visiting all seven churches individually along with a series of interviews by personnel connected to our churches in various capacities. It was indeed a day of contemplation and we thank all those involved.

On the last Sunday in 2017 the seven churches will join together at Holy Trinity Church in Balsham at 10am for a United Service with communion. The following week we meet again at Balsham church (7 January, Epiphany Sunday) where we will be blessed with a visit from the Bishop of Ely. Bishop Stephen has expressed a wish to preside and preach at a Parish Eucharist and to bless the Balsham Plough. This service is at 10.45am.

On Sunday 21 January we will once again join our friends at the United Reformed Church at 2.30pm, when the service will be led by Revd. Bruce Waldron, and a warm and friendly welcome always awaits us.

Linton Village College

The New Year creates an opportunity to set resolutions. For many, the indulgence of the festive season prompts a focus on developing a healthier lifestyle. For others, the new calendar year encourages a commitment to try a new hobby or skill.

The College's Sports Centre characteristically sees a spike in membership and use in January. Having such a facility for the community is part of what makes our Village College a special one. Chris Baker, our Sports Centre Manager, is keen to continue to increase participation, as is Margaret Kiddy, our Adult Education Manager, who has introduced a number of new evening classes, taster sessions and weekend workshops to develop our adult education learning programme.

The philosophy of the Village College movement was to ensure that schools were at the heart of their villages and provided opportunities for life-long learning and community activity. Having the school buildings and outdoor facilities busy outside of the school day is an important aspect of our school character, as is welcoming visitors into the College to share special moments and activities.

At the end of the autumn term, we had lots of events of this nature. This was a great public speaking challenge and one that provided a great deal of access to cultural capital. Students at Linton Village College are fortunate to have staff who are committed to making these enriching extra-curricular activities possible through planning trips and visits and providing opportunities to experience real-life learning. While many schools are stripping back non-academic provision due to financial and workload pressures, we remain committed to offering a rich, holistic education experience for all of our learners.

Beware! Scam phone calls

Please be aware of a nasty scam that has recently caused an Abington resident considerable distress. A phone caller, claiming to be "BT Security" or "TeamView", warns that there are fraudsters operating in the area and that your identity and bank security are at risk. The caller is prepared to spend a long time extracting information from you and will ask you to reveal your bank details and agree to their accessing your computer remotely. Luckily for this resident, the conversation was overheard by someone who realised it was a scam and intervened. The police advise people not to engage with callers – don't worry about being rude, just end the call – and never, ever allow someone remote access to your computer. In this instance it was a near thing but fortunately no harm was done.

Parish Council meeting 27 November

Public participation: closure of Granta Park

Feelings continue to run high about the closure of Granta Park among residents of the Abingtons. In the public participation session at November's meeting, several residents spoke about their frustration at the apparent lack of progress concerning the issue. Following their representation, the Parish Council agreed to provide possible dates for a further public meeting, to be held in the New Year, by 4 December. A number of dates have been identified. Please see the village website and noticeboards for information. Meanwhile, the Parish Council encourages residents to take advantage of the access that has been authorised, via the main entrance to Granta Park, and respect the routes indicated on the map provided.

Final budget plan

The Parish Council's final budget plan was discussed and agreed. Full details are available on the Council's page on the village website.

Planning

The Parish Council will be commenting on the planning application for an agri-tech park south of the A505 (Hinxton parish), near the McDonald's/BP garage roundabout.

Local policing

Like many other local authorities, South Cambs. has decided that there will be no new intake of Police Community Support Officers. Numbers will be reduced through natural turnover, enabling the recruitment of 50 new police officers.

The full minutes of the Parish Council meeting are on the village website and on the noticeboard in Church Lane. There was no meeting in December.

Tree felling

The removal of the large dead elm on the footpath leading to the Millennium Bridge had to be postponed. Residents will be notified of the revised date as soon as possible.

The members of the Parish Council wish all residents a very happy New Year.

Health Centre

There is a proposal to merge the Granta Medical Practice with Shelford Medical Centre, enlarging the service offered in our area. This is currently out for consultation, and if you've got any comments contact Gerard Newnham – gerard.newnham@nhs.net or 01223 727 555 (see also page 18).

Neighbourhood Plan

The feedback from the last consultation has been analysed and changes made to the plan. At the last minute the South Cambs. highways team changed its initial advice and has requested a traffic survey be carried out. This will take place in early January and, when complete, will be added to the plan, which will then be submitted to South Cambs. for the next step of the process.

Shire Hall

A County Council working party is still working on proposals to move the council's HQ out of Shire Hall in Cambridge which is expensive to maintain. Options it is developing for alternative new premises are Alconbury and Northstowe. With the new Mayor having proposed to review local government arrangements in Cambridgeshire and Peterborough, however, it is not clear that there will continue to be a County Council.

Strategic Bus Review

The Mayor and Combined Authority have agreed to spend up to £150,000 on a strategic review of bus provision in Cambridgeshire and Peterborough.

Cambridge City Stadium

At its November meeting South Cambs. planning committee granted planning permission for a new stadium for Cambridge City Football Club in Sawston.

The previous planning permission was overturned at judicial review on a technicality. Although it is derelict land, the site is in the Green Belt. And although recreational use is an allowed use of Green Belt land, the planning policy hurdles are still huge. The committee voted by eight votes to two in favour of the development because of the very special circumstances. Those were predominantly

the improvement of the site, with open parkland, the Club's pitches, and of fulfilling the shortfall of recreational space in the village.

The petition presented at the meeting showed that there is widespread backing for the proposal in the area and from a majority of Sawston residents. This is a fantastic result for the village of Sawston and for the whole district. It is great that the Club is back on track to getting a new permanent home.

The Three Hills

As a village we are really lucky to have a vibrant pub in the village which has great local support. If you are thinking of trying another village, The Three Hills pub in Bartlow has been closed for over a year now and, after a local investor was persuaded to buy the pub and invest heavily in its renovation, they are due to open in time for Christmas this year. The official open date is Friday 15 December.

Granta and Shelford Medical Practices Proposed merger

The NHS is changing rapidly. General Practice remains the bedrock of the NHS but needs to adapt to be able to meet both current and future needs of our populations.

Nationally there is already a significant shortfall in GP numbers and this is going to get worse. With an aging population, health care needs are more complex and patients are attending the surgery much more frequently than in the past. Government policy is that only large general practices will get access to new funding streams. Without this additional resource, patient care will suffer.

The GPs of both Granta Medical Practices (Barley, Royston, Linton and Sawston) and Shelford Health Centre believe that the best option for maintaining and improving services for our patients is through coming together to form a single practice. At present the practices are consulting on this proposed merger. We are keen to seek views of all those who might be affected.

We believe that by coming together the existing services provided to our patients will not just be more sustainable but that we will be able to add new services, enabling improved care in our practices. A merger also facilitates the hoped-for integration of community nursing and support teams with the practices as part of the nationally recognised "Primary Care Home" model of integrated care.

There is no suggestion of, or intention to, shut any of the surgeries down nor to stop providing core general practice consultations from each site. Some administrative and specialist services may be delivered from a single location.

Already the Granta merged practices are better placed to retain and recruit clinical staff than many surrounding practices, ensuring high levels of continued service despite the national shortage of doctors and nurses in primary care.

Shelford and Granta Medical Practices are committed to providing the best possible care for our patients within the NHS system.

We are keen to evolve to remain as relevant for our community in the next half century as we have been since the foundation of the NHS. Together, with some 44,000 patients, we will be big enough to deliver modern healthcare while remaining small enough to care and be responsive to our patient needs.
