Letter from the Editor

At last we have the welcome news that the Bishop of Ely has appointed a vicar for the seven churches, including those of Great and Little Abington and Hildersham. This must be a great relief to all those in the Ministry Team and the churchwardens who have maintained services and church events since August 2016. We can look forward to welcoming the Revd Iain McColl and his family in early April (see pages 4-5). More details next month.

There was a joyful Plough Sunday service at Balsham for all seven churches on 7 January (see page 5). Another of the popular Messy Church services will be on 4 February and will be held in the Institute (page 6). Scarcely have we got used to it being 2018 than we should take note that Lent begins on 14 February and Easter Sunday will fall on 1 April. Pancakes will be served in Jeremiah's Café on 13 February (page 11).

January has brought extraordinarily variable weather, including blue skies and sunshine, very cold days, heavy rain and strong winds that damaged buildings. Thank goodness that Rod Wilcox organised the delivery of heating oil in the Abingtons and there is a Heating Oil Syndicate in Hildersham to keep the residents well supplied (pages 8, 13). The days are noticeably lengthening, and snowdrops are appearing to remind us that spring may not be far off (see cover photo).

February is the month when two green bin collections start again (page 11). Bearing in mind the Blue Planet II warnings on TV about the environmental damage that plastic causes, we need to make maximum use of the blue bins for recycling.

The Parish Councils remind us of important transport-related matters (pages 13, 14). Speedwatch is operating again and more volunteer helpers would be welcome. Parked vehicles on the High Street, from Lewis Crescent to Pampisford Road, are causing obstacles for buses and it would be hugely detrimental to village users of the service if this congestion led to re-routing of buses. The parking charge at Park and Ride sites is to be discontinued.

The Abington Cricket Club had a very successful season in 2017 and it is good to have a report on page 18. Many residents, whose lawns have been torn up by crows searching for juicy chafer grubs, will sympathise with the club whose ground has been similarly vandalised. We wish the Cricket Club every success in 2018 both in competitive matches and in restoring the well-kept ground.

Cambridgeshire Fire and Rescue Service Bulletin

On-call firefighters are a vital part of today's fire and rescue service, providing an efficient, effective service that gives emergency cover to more than 90 per cent of the UK. In Cambridgeshire they make up 56 per cent of the workforce.

An on-call firefighter is not based at a fire station but carries a pager and responds to emergency incidents as and when they happen. They receive an annual wage to reflect the time they commit to being available, plus additional payments for attending incidents and drill nights (one evening a week for two hours).

On-call firefighters are men and women who may have other jobs and are able to provide evening, daytime, or weekend cover. When they are on-call they may be at home, working for themselves or for a nearby company, or out in their local community within our 5 minute radius of the station itself. Our on-call Firefighters are mainly located in rural communities, small towns and villages, and we will be able to tell you if you are within range to apply to be an on-call firefighter.

Hildersham Parish Council A Quality Parish Council



Report on the Hildersham Parish Council meeting held on 9 January 2018.

The defibrillator familiarisation training evening was very well attended on 28 November. The access code to the equipment has been circulated as widely as possible in Hildersham, but if you do not have the details please contact the Clerk. There are plans for basic instructions to use the equipment along with access code, to be circulated within Hildersham in the next few weeks.

The council hopes to have the electricity supplied to the two new lights in Beech Row and opposite the village hall as soon as possible. The delay has been caused by Balfour Beatty underestimating the length of cabling/trenches required to connect the columns to the power supply.

The council agreed to engage a pest control company to deal with the rats on the allotments and will be contacting allotment holders to highlight measures they can take to make access to feed and shelter harder for the rodents on the allotments.

As grass maintenance has been unsatisfactory for the last few years, with infrequent and poor quality grass cutting the council has decided to get the work done by a Hildersham resident.

The next meeting of Hildersham Parish Council will be on Tuesday 13 March 2018 from 7.30pm at Hildersham Village Hall, High Street, Hildersham Everyone welcome.

Linton Village College

With the cabinet reshuffle in January came the announcement of Justine Greening's resignation and a new Secretary of State for Education: Damian Hinds. During my two years as Principal at LVC, there have been three different ministers in this top position. Nicky Morgan was known for her focus on character education, Justine Greening for using schooling as a vehicle for social mobility. We are still awaiting details of Mr Hinds' vision and values.

In many ways, it is great that since Blair's 'Education, education, education' pledge in his 1997 speech, schooling has become a more pressing priority for the government. However, Greening's exit signals yet more change for the profession. Given the amount of turbulence since 2010, teachers are understandably anxious about what policies the new Secretary of State may introduce to make his mark.

In recent years there has been substantial profile given to ministerial priorities including free/grammar schools, free breakfasts/lunches and school funding, to name a few. This has been against a backdrop of significant government-driven reform that has seen the removal of National Curriculum levels, new, more challenging, primary and GCSE testing and a hike in accountability.

The doorstep manifesto released by the Headteachers' Roundtable, a national non-political educational think tank of which I am a member, has the following guiding principles: 1. The pace of educational change should not be affected by party politics, 2. Schools must be able to offer all their pupils the chance to thrive, 3. Educational change should begin by identifying the desired outcomes for children, 4. Prioritising high quality teaching & learning and the curriculum will lead to world class assessment and accountability, 5. The teaching profession should be centrally involved in developing future education policy.

In 2012, Mr Hinds published an All-Party Parliamentary report in which he stated a need to "focus first on quality of teachers and teaching". I hope that his 18 years in the hospitality industry have given him a disposition to listen to and serve the education community.

People are incredibly important in education, but it is children, not political preferences, that need to be at the centre of education policy.

News from Abington Woods

Community Oil Order

Congestion in the High Street

There have been a number of issues with buses not being able to navigate the section of the High Street from Lewis Crescent to Pampisford Road. There are many people who rely on the bus service going through the village and we don't want to lose it because of problems caused by cars parked half on the road and half on the pavement. We are seeking residents' views on having double yellow lines on both sides of the road. Please contact the Clerk, Paula Harper, to give us your opinion.

Hedges

Some hedges are growing out onto pavements in the village. These are creating a danger for users of wheelchairs, mobility scooters and pushchairs who have to use the road instead of the pavement thus putting them in danger. Would all residents check and cut back their hedges now, as they should not be cut between 1 March and 31 August to avoid the bird nesting season, so February is a good time.

Rubbish

There will be the annual village clear up nearer to Easter (date to follow). There seem to be a number of sites around the village where bottles and cans are being dumped. Can we ask residents to use bins for this rubbish and not to litter the village. If you see any and could put them in a bin then please do so, you don't have to wait for the official village clean up day.

Park and Ride Parking Charge

The Greater Cambridge Partnership has agreed to subsidise the removal of the charge to park at the P&R sites from April this year. Since the charge was introduced, usage of the Park and Ride service has dropped significantly.

A1307 Improvements

The final option for the A1307 will be consulted on from 9 February. There are three options but the proposals for the Haverhill to A11 are the same for them all. As this first phase of road safety and bus priority measures is, hopefully, non-contentious work could start possibly as early as this summer. Detailed proposals can be seen on the website: www.greatercambridge.org.uk look for 'Cambridge South East Transport Study'.

Affordable houses at Moorefield

Five of these will be in the hands of the council in March/April. These will be advertised on Homelink <http://www.home-link.org.uk/> . First priority will go to those who have a connection with the village. The two fixed equity properties will be dealt with by BMA Property Group and will be on the open market with a bias towards local people. They will initially be looking for older people wanting to downsize, as they are bungalows.

Village Gazebo

We had a good turnout at our first meeting of 2018 to hear a most interesting and entertaining talk by Revd Dr Nicholas Henderson on 'Whatever happened after Henry VIII?' After a reign of turmoil, tyranny and overindulgence Henry died aged 55 and his son by Jane Seymour became king. Edward VI, aged only 9, was known as 'The Boy King', the first monarch to be raised a Protestant. He was a sickly child and the country was run by his protectors: firstly, the Duke of Somerset, his uncle, then by the Duke of Northumberland. Before he died at 16, he wrote his Device of Succession which led to 50 years of women on the throne: firstly, Protestant Lady Jane Grey, who only reigned for 9 days, then unpopular Mary I, who tried to restore Catholicism and had 300 Protestants burned at the stake, followed by Elizabeth I, a Protestant and last of the Tudor monarchs. Considered one of the country's most successful and popular monarchs, she was clever, enigmatic and flirtatious. Her reign was marked by increased international exploration and trade, greater stability for the Church of England and expansion of the arts and academic institutions. Despite conspiracies against her at home and conflicts abroad, her 45 years on the throne helped forge a sense of national identity.

This may be in our private clinic if you require yellow fever, rabies, Japanese encephalitis or malaria tablets, which you will need to pay for, or an NHS travel appointment will be offered if just needing hepatitis A, typhoid or a tetanus booster, which are free.

Please remember, some vaccines need 4 – 6 weeks to complete courses, so please contact us in good time.
