From the Seven Churches

It's the time of year when leaves are turning russet brown and falling, conkers appear on paths and playgrounds and there is a medley of fireworks and early Christmas craft fairs! Amidst all these activities and before we look ahead to Christmas, there is also the opportunity to engage with another ancient festival.

All Hallows or All Saints' Day is celebrated in many places at the beginning of November and is a tradition with a rich history. Paul the apostle referred to all communities of Christians as 'saints' – people called to love God and their neighbour and to seek fullness of life by following Christ. Gradually, a feast day emerged on which the Church gave thanks for the lives and deaths of the 'saints' including those famous and obscure.

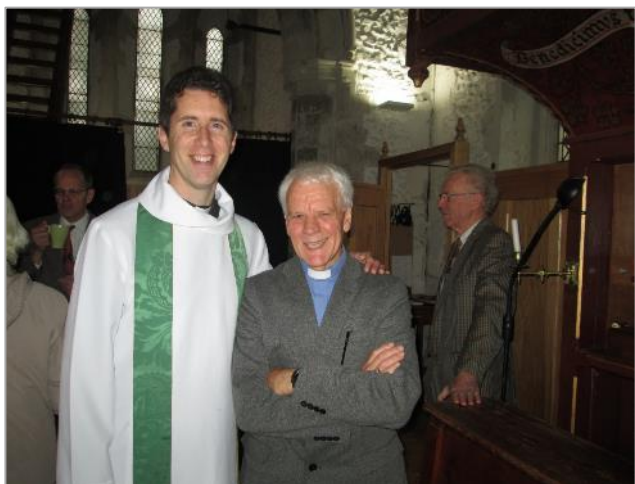
All Saints' Day is like a family reunion day for the church, when the old family photograph albums are pulled out and we remember where we came from. Stories are swapped of relatives in the faith, 'saints' old and new, and we pray for God's continued guidance.

It's also a time when we can reflect on an unsung saint in our neighbourhood, whose faithful acts of kindness and generosity inspire us and perhaps portray a richer, deeper experience of life with all its sorrows and joys.

Most people can think of their own example of an unsung saint. Perhaps someone who acted as a mentor in our childhood or inspired us later in life. By remembering and being grateful for such people, we also recall our own responsibility to support and inspire others in similar ways. In doing so, we may point towards a life of faith, hope and love, the fullness of life of which All Saints' Day reminds us.

A Quality Parish Council

The next meeting of Hildersham Parish Council will be on Tuesday 13 November at Hildersham Village Hall from 7.30pm and everyone is welcome to attend.



Neighbourhood Plan After a lengthy process with a considerable number of hurdles that needed to be jumped, it looks likely that the Neighbourhood Plan for the former Land Settlement will be going to referendum before Christmas. The external examiner has now delivered his report concluding that, subject to some amendments to the Neighbourhood Plan, it meets all the necessary legal requirements and should proceed to referendum. The examiner's report can be viewed on the SCDC and the Abingtons websites. To comply with national regulations, SCDC will now consider the Examiner's Report and will decide what action to take, including making a formal decision on whether the Neighbourhood Plan should proceed to referendum. When the Neighbourhood Plan does go to referendum a simple majority 'yes' vote will see the Neighbourhood Plan become part of planning policy for the area, whereas a majority 'no' vote will result in the current planning situation continuing and all the hard work will have been wasted.

Amateur Arboreal Antics Tree felling can be a dangerous activity if you don't know what you are doing! The Parish Council has been informed of trees being cut down that fell onto a neighbour's land and another one that fell across a road, endangering those passing by. As with most contracts, residents are urged to ensure that tradespeople are suitably skilled and insured when you engage them for an activity. Otherwise you could end up with a large bill and no insurance cover.

AgriTech Technology Park The proposal for a major development near Hinxton was refused but has now gone to appeal and will be determined by an inquiry. The Parish Council objected due to the impact on Sawston roundabout and surrounding roads. All the original representations have been forwarded to the Planning Inspectorate. A1307 Moving ahead on safety improvements east of Four Went Ways. Late news is that Greater Cambridge Partnership has adopted Strategy 1, a “mass transit” (busway or similar) route from here to Addenbrooke’s.

Notes from Parish Council Meeting on 24 September

Noise from TWI Members of the public asked about this. TWI had stated that they had added an additional temporary cooling circuit to the system considered to be the most likely source. However, this had made no detectable improvement for those living closest. A further electrical change to reduce the fans’ rotating velocity (and therefore noise) was expected within a couple of weeks.

It was emphasised that the nuisance is also severe through the winter and it was felt that a major change was needed before next summer. We agreed to press TWI for a full solution. Discussions are ongoing with South Cambs. Environmental Health, which have carried out a series of monitoring trials in the village.

Old Four Went Ways roundabout Another person asked about progress on the problems of lorry parking. After the site meeting in April there had initially been some improvement in bin emptying, but this appears to have ceased and the problem is worsening. Some of the lorry parking is dangerous, especially when they overflow onto the adjacent roads, and causes extensive damage to the verges, etc. It was agreed that the situation is unacceptable. We will chase up the district council about the bins and ask our county Highways contact whether there are any changes that could be made to improve the situation with the lorries.

- **S/3370/18/FL 19, Bourn Bridge Road** - Two Storey Front and Rear Extensions. Agreed to make no recommendation but to comment on the impact on the street scene.
- **S/3403/18/PN Meadowbrook Farm, Cambridge Road, Great Abington**) - proposed Dutch barn. Agreed to make no comment, as it is prior notification of an agricultural / forestry development and GAPC had considered it.
- **S/4099/17/OL Agritech development near Hinxton**. The developers have appealed against refusal of their proposal: we will consider further comment at our next meeting.
- **S/2697/18/FL 29 West Field**. Single storey side and rear extensions. New flue to woodburning stove and internal alterations. *Approved*
- **S/2666/18/TC 51 High Street**. Trimming of Walnut Tree. *Approved*

Local Development Plan. Inspector’s report published. Adoption expected at September district council meeting.

After the traditional bow and "Konbanwa" greeting we were 'transported' to Japan, as Teresa Patterson showed us lovely slides of her visit at cherry blossom time in April. The festival of Sakura is very important to the Japanese: everyone goes with family and friends to admire and enjoy the beautiful blossom and at night the trees are lit up with lanterns. We travelled from Tokyo to the old capital city of Kyoto by bullet train (spotless, punctual and no mobile phones!) and saw the wondrous Golden Temple (one of 1,600 in this city!); then on to Hiroshima and the memorial in the Peace Park with 220,000 names of those who died as a result of the atomic bomb dropped in 1945. Minor earth tremors occur almost daily in Japan. In Tokyo the Sky Tree, a building 634m. high, can withstand an earthquake magnitude of 7. Sylvia's quiz tested our general knowledge. We were astonished at the population of Tokyo – 35million! The lack of domestic space for cooking and eating means many people go out to eat: vending machines sell hot food items, in fact everything from drinks to knickers! Afterwards, delicious refreshments, including sushi and sake, were served to us before it was time to say "Sayonara" at the end of a lovely evening.
