Letter from the Editor

February has brought remarkably mild weather, with record high temperatures of 16°C and some superb sunsets. This makes it credible that Sunday 31 March will bring the start of British Summer Time when the clocks go forward one hour. Given the vagaries of the British climate there could, however, still be wintry weather to come.

Little Abington is welcoming an extra minister to join the seven churches team and there is a new Granta Vale Community Hub offering opportunities to strengthen community links (pages 4, 6).

The Abingtons have a village clean up on Saturday 30 March and hope for a lot of residents to turn up at the Institute ready to don gloves and fill bags with rubbish. It is encouraging that several people have offered help to the new footpath champion. Could you join in? Great Abington Parish Council has a very active programme and is now in need of a new councillor. See page 7.

There is still time for people to provide views on the future of the Abingtons. Strong support already for the petition to improve Four Went Ways has strengthened the hand of those pressing for change in this area. Work has been done to improve parts of the A1307 and comments are sought on routes for the Cambridge to Oxford rail link (pages 14, 15).

TWI has provided an interesting update on developments (page 13).

Installation of water main works in Great Abington High Street is causing full or, at times, partial closure of the road. It may be that the greatest inconvenience is for people using the buses, which now have to be rerouted.

We all enjoy the home cooking on offer in Jeremiah's Café, and especially the cakes. But demand is outstripping supply and page 13 presents an impassioned plea for those with cake-making skills to volunteer some help. Lent begins on 7 March but there will be pancakes to enjoy the day before (page 16).

Volunteers are also needed to help with the local Scout and Guide groups, surely a most rewarding endeavour (pages 6, 9).

In addition to the usual varied array of activities on offer please note a regular monthly opportunity to play bingo and cribbage at Abington Social Club, and there are four classes of differing levels of Physio Pilates on Mondays. (Pages 10, 11, 12)

From the Seven Churches

Springtime is often associated with a renewal of energy and fresh vision. This month there will be a new minister joining our team, Jeanine Kennedy, who will be living in Little Abington and working throughout our parishes (see page 6). One of the many advantages of someone new joining a team is that they bring with them a fresh perspective. This can lead to a renewal of vision and energy, a different way of seeing the world.

As we approach Lent this month, the period of around 40 days prior to Easter, we may also experience this as a time of renewal. Lent has traditionally been a time of stepping back from regular patterns to reflect on life. Some aim to give something up; others to take something on. In either case it may encourage us to see the world differently and perhaps appreciate things we have been taking for granted. It may also help us, as St Paul said in his letter to the Romans, 'to be transformed by the renewing of your minds'.

In the Christian faith during Lent we often reflect on the story of Jesus being led by the Holy Spirit into the wilderness for 40 days. Just prior to this, Jesus had been baptised in the River Jordan and experienced a revelation affirming his identity as the Son of God. He was then led into the wilderness to discover more about what it meant to be the Son of God and maybe see the world anew.

Lent can also be a time when we renew our vision. Do we need to take a step back from our regular pattern of doing things to see with a different perspective? Do we need to review our priorities and be transformed by the renewing of our minds? Perhaps in doing so, we may become more aware of the sheer wonder of being human and of the pearl of great price, which is the presence of God in our lives.

Please take the time to inspect your hedges and trees. Your hedge should not encroach beyond the edge of your property and not block any part of a road or footpath. Do check before cutting back to ensure that there are no birds nesting. The RSPB recommend the following "... cutting hedges and trees is avoided between March and August as this is the main breeding season for nesting birds. It is an offence under Section 1 of the Wildlife and Countryside Act of 1981 to intentionally take, damage, or destroy the nest of any wild bird while it is in use or being built."

A Quality Parish Council



Report on the Hildersham Parish Council meeting held on 29 January 2019.

Peter Cousin has volunteered to join the Parish Council and will be co-opted as a councillor at the March meeting; he will bring the numbers up to full strength with five councillors.

Councillors agreed to increase the precept by £1,000 for the year, bringing the total precept to £13,000 to cover the council’s costs for the year; the precept has been at £12,000 for over 10 years.

The Clerk has been corresponding with the land agent who works for Pampisford Estate about the landowner getting the allotment boundary hedge reduced in height before the end of February. It is hoped that this will enable the neighbouring allotment plots to have a full growing season with their plots in sunlight.

The council solicitors will be writing to the Charity Commission to seek advice on how the council should proceed in its aim to use part of the South Holding to build a few houses, including some for local people, as well as erecting a new

village hall on the land. It is very likely that a new Trust for the land will need to be created.

Councillors decided to enter an agreement with Mrs Tunnicliffe over the leasing of the Recreation Ground for grazing sheep. This arrangement benefits the council as the grazing helps maintain the land and saves the cost of getting the field cut.

The next meeting of Hildersham Parish Council will be on Tuesday 12 March 2019 at Hildersham Village Hall from 7.30pm and everyone is welcome to attend.

Linton Village College

There are a number of international and national days, some of which we observe and celebrate at Linton Village College. Wednesday 20 March will mark French Language Day and International Day of Happiness. Fortuitously, a large group of our Year 10 GCSE students will spend this day in France enjoying a week of immersive language speaking

The Châteaux trip has become an important experience for our students, allowing them to sample the culture and language of a foreign country to give a real life context to their academic studies. It also provides a rich programme of activities that promote team work and encourage students to venture out of their comfort zones.

Our International Schools Award recognises our commitment to international learning activities. It is important that young people have a window into different cultures and countries, helping them to develop as responsible global citizens.

We are also proud of our achievements in the arts. We have been hugely successful in both ABRSM exams and Arts Awards at bronze, silver and gold levels. These are an important recognition of the College's success in delivering a broad and balanced curriculum experience. This year's school production, *Annie* will showcase the great talents and hard work of a large number of our students and the skills and hard work of our arts team at LVC. It is brilliant to see so many young people taking pride in creative ventures and performances.

The development of arts leaders among College staff and students has helped to extend this experience to younger students at local schools. Pupils at our Trust primary schools have benefited from enriching arts opportunities including African clay mask-making at the Meadow Primary School, delivering singing tuition at Howard Community Primary School, resulting in a performance in the Young Voices concert at the O2, and growing arts partnership provision at Linton Heights Junior School.

Our team of cultural arts leaders in schools and academies (CALSAs) and Arts Cluster is currently preparing an arts festival to take place in the summer term involving a range of students from CHET schools and across the locality.

Spring update from TWI

The appointment in February of new Chief Executive Aamir Khalid marks a new era at TWI. Aamir has worked at Abington for 20 years, with several years in industry before joining as a section manager specialising in applying robotics to non-destructive testing. He progressed to lead TWI's non-destructive testing group in 2004 and became Technology Director in 2010. Christoph Wiesner, whose contribution is acknowledged on our website, stepped down after 9 years' service and will retire in the summer.

We are pleased to work with the churches, GA Primary and many local organisations across the year with ongoing support for events and activities. Many TWI staff live close by and we are keen to reinforce these community links.

Continued efforts to identify noise disturbance experienced by some Little Abington residents saw a programme of system testing and monitoring, by TWI and the local authority environmental health team. Monitoring could not identify any one source of noise; however, it allowed operational improvements to some systems to optimise output. Sound and vibration monitoring by an independent consultant is ongoing and we are grateful for the help of residents in all these exercises. The next meeting to share progress will be in March.

With completion of the Illumina complex, the Pampisford Road footpath recently reopened to allow staff access to the Park. Village access for the time being remains via the main gates. Granta Park visitors arriving in the village by bus may telephone the number on the gate to request access.

Meeting in January 2019

New parish councillor: We welcomed a new parish councillor, Viia Archer, who lives in West Field.

Planning

S/4644/18/FL. Retrospective application for works linked to new food outlets, including Burger King, at Four Went Ways. Objected to the application and requested that the SCDC planning committee makes a site visit to see the design, materials and appearance, plus the litter, public health concerns and traffic and highway safety. Also requested that conditions on litter clearance should be enforced. We noted the public's concern, as expressed in the petition about Four Went Ways.

S/4329/18/OL. Wellcome Trust, Hinxton. Outline application for phased mixed-use development including 1,500 dwellings, offices, laboratories and associated infrastructure. LAPC objected to the application on land that was not included in the Local Development Plan. The key concerns were the scale of the development, traffic and transport infrastructure and lack of effective solutions, plus visual and environmental impact.

We also noted that SCDC had approved:

S/3816/18/FL. 50 High Street. Retrospective erection of fence and shed.

S/3886/18/FL. 1 West Field. Single-storey side extension.

Abington & Hildersham Women's Institute

Our speaker for February was unable to attend, so meteorologist Professor John Turner kindly stepped in and took us on a trip to Antarctica, which contains 90% of the world's ice. In 1943 the British established a base at Port Lockroy for Operation Tabarin, a secret expedition to gather meteorological data for Allied shipping in the South Atlantic. After the war more bases were set up for scientific study and it became the Falkland Islands Dependencies Survey. After the Antarctic Treaty to regulate research and development in the area, it became the British Antarctic Survey. Port Lockroy is now a tourist attraction for thousands of visitors every year. The newest Halley bases are on skis on the floating ice shelf so that they can be dragged back onto thicker ice as the edges melt. Only four bases remain occupied all year round: the winter is bitterly cold, dark and very long – not everyone can survive this isolation. During the summer some of the sea-ice melts but only 1% of the land is ice-free. There are no trees or shrubs, only moss and areas of delicate plant life. Satellites are now used to photograph and track penguin rookeries. During field studies to take ice samples scientists live in two-man (or woman) tents and in bad weather they may be unable to leave the tent for up to a week! The deepest core ever drilled was 3270m. It contains compressed air bubbles and ash which help to assess its age. Some ice is 800,000 years old. The hole in the ozone layer that developed in the 1980s due to CFCs is not expected to recover until 2060. Meanwhile sea-level is rising by 3cm every decade. John was a very interesting speaker and gave many examples of the impact that human behaviour and natural disasters have on Antarctica - much food for thought about the WI Campaign for Climate Change. We need to take action now!

Five members visited Babraham Institute for a fascinating introduction to Stem Cell Research.
