From the Seven Churches

When I was a child a favourite book of mine was called *A Time of Gifts* by Patrick Leigh Fermor. It is narrated by Leigh Fermor as an older man, looking back on his time as an eighteen-year-old journeying on foot across Europe in the 1930s, from the Hook of Holland to Constantinople. One of the themes of the book is how, as a young man, he had very little materially and carried with him all he needed on his back, yet life itself was adventurous, rich and full of wonder – a time of gifts.

In our current unsettling times, we face many challenges: uncertainties about the future for ourselves and our loved ones, concerns about health, schooling for children, difficulties in our workplaces and in the wider economy. Yet even with all these pressures, we may still hold onto a vision of gift and gratitude. Now my children have returned to their primary school, for example, I am realising all over again how much I enjoy the school run and how grateful I am to all the staff for the way they encourage the children.

This idea of a time of gifts and daily gratitude is reflected in the harvest thanksgivings which churches across the country are celebrating this Autumn. For many, however, they will be celebrations like no other. As we try and work out what the 'rule of six' may mean for our lives or consider what 'living well' means in these times, communal celebrations take on a new hue. In all our churches there will be face to face services, but we will be limited in numbers. We continue to have Zoom services, but we appreciate not everybody will be able to access these easily. Yet one thing we can still focus on in our harvest thanksgiving is that gratitude before God is central to our worship and shapes our lives as followers of Christ.

The Christian faith has always encouraged us to see our lives, and the time we have, as a gift, something reflected in the Lord's Prayer as we ask for "*our daily bread*". Perhaps the current crisis may focus our hearts and minds on what matters most and even inspire us towards greater gratitude. It was in uncertain times that St Paul reminded the church to be intentional about three things: "*Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances*". Giving thanks in all circumstances, although not *for* all circumstances! These are practices of purposeful Christian living that help us to re-discover the gifts we have, even in the hardest times, and help us to value them afresh and to value each other. When we do this, we may remember we live too in a time of gifts and give thanks to God in all circumstances.

In 2019 nearly 11 million boxes were sent to many parts of the world. This year, for all of us, has been quite different and possibly difficult as well. This is true for those in other poorer countries where the need is just as, if not more, important than previously.

Boxes are given to any underprivileged child regardless of faith or no faith through churches or other Christian organisations. It aims to show God’s love in a tangible way.

Collection week is 9 to 16 November. You can get your own shoebox and cover it, or I have flat pack ones, also leaflets. There are three age groups 2-4yrs, 5-9yrs, 10-14yrs, boys or girls.

If you would like to take part in this fantastic project you could do one of three things:

Fill a shoebox with exciting items that children will love to receive.

Donate items for a shoebox, - stationery, hats, gloves, scarves, socks, soap, flannels, comb, small toys, soft toys (can be home-made) skipping rope, puzzle, balls, colouring book, jewellery.

County and District Council September report

A1307 Update

The work on the A1307 is continuing, with the next updates to our stretch of the road being average speed cameras installed between Haverhill and Linton. Going through the processes is a new roundabout at the Bartlow Road, Linton junction of the A1307 and a remodelling of the Dean Road crossing on the dual carriageway.

There have been workshops over July and August looking at specific schemes on the A1307. The schemes that drew the most concern were the proposed westbound bus lane at Linton and the loss of the rural 'hub' at Linton, but there is a slim chance this could be looked at later.

Experimental Traffic Orders

The County Council, acting on government legislation, has started implementing some temporary traffic regulation orders around the county. The first few are only in Cambridge city at the moment and are designed, whilst the roads are supposedly quieter, to close some roads to vehicles (bar emergency services) to encourage non-motorised travel. There is talk of trialling some in rural areas, but nothing concrete yet.

Self-employed Support

The government has announced that the self-employed can claim an additional payment from them. Info can be found on the government's website or John and Henry can assist via the District Council.

Zero Carbon Communities Grant

Round 2 of the SCDC Zero Carbon Communities Grant is now open. This year the grant is focusing on three main themes – cycling, community buildings and tree planting and other nature-based initiatives. Applications are invited from parish councils and community groups. The total available is £100,000 with individual grants of £1,000 - £15,000. The scheme opened on Wednesday 1st July and the application deadline is 5pm Wednesday 30th September.

Electoral Register

The District Council is doing its annual canvas to get the electoral register up to date. Please do encourage anyone that you know is not registered to do so and follow the steps shown in the letters sent by SCDC.

Devolution

There is some talk within central government that they are leaning towards more unitary authorities in the country, so fewer layers of local government and just one authority that deals with everything. This is the current setup in Peterborough. This will be a constantly moving beast, so keep your ears to the ground.

Fostering

The County Council are constantly on the hunt for more foster carers. They are having a big drive and are holding various events around Cambridgeshire to promote this. Protected roadside verges

The Protected Roadside Verge (PRV), marked by blue posts along the length of Bourn Bridge Road, is a designated area due to its special habitat, species and ecological interest. We manage the verges following a nationally agreed protocol and the Abington Naturewatch Group does an annual survey of plants and this year found 32 different species. Over the past six months a path has been worn along one of the verges. We request that you walk on the path in single file to avoid trampling on the wild flowers and there should definitely be no bikes or horses.

Your Parish Council

We welcome residents' interest and participation in the work of Great Abington Parish Council. A recent letter of complaint regarding housing developments in our area has prompted us to clarify the role of Parish Councils.

- Parish Councils are a form of local council - they are the lowest tier of local government and are statutory bodies. They serve electorates and are independently elected and raise their own precept (which is part of the council tax). GAPC has not increased its precept since 2012.
- Apart from the parish clerk, the work of Parish Councils is unpaid.
- Parish Councils are consulted by the local planning authority over planning applications, **but please note the Parish Council has no statutory power in planning decisions. We can only make recommendations, which may or may not be accepted by South Cambs. District Council, and to carry any weight at all these recommendations must be in line with material planning considerations.**
- When considering whether to recommend approval or rejection of an application we at Great Abington Parish Council have uppermost in our minds the advantages/disadvantages to our whole community.
- When a developer applies for planning permission, we keenly state the local housing need, and indeed did so with the on-going housing development on Linton Road. The Parish Council does not have the ability to influence the price that a developer, or any other property owner, sells their property for.
- We are legally obliged to declare personal interest in planning matters, and our parish councillors abstain from commenting on applications in which they have an interest. This process is transparent, occurring at our Parish Council meetings, all of which are public, and recorded in our meeting Minutes.

We hope this explanation will prevent future misunderstandings. There is a lot of online information for those wishing to explore the subject further or understand the responsibilities of the three tiers of local government. Anyone wishing to become more involved in the work of Great Abington Parish Council, please contact any of us.

Planting schemes around the Village

Residents will have noticed the removal of raised flowerbeds along the verge at Linton Road and at the High St/Pampisford Road T-junction. The verges are owned by and the responsibility of the County Council which will not allow any cultivation of the verge itself. The raised beds were built on paving slabs. They were dismantled because of structural damage that was beyond economic repair.

We have since had enquiries about replacement planting in these locations. Suggestions were made on the Abington Village Community Group Facebook page of a parish-council funded 'green-fingers' club being formed that could tend, where permitted, attractive planting schemes around the village. If anyone is interested in running or participating in such a club, please get in touch before or at our next parish council meeting – third Monday in November – and we would be delighted to explore this idea with you.
