Letter from the Editor

No rain in April has been followed by frequent showers in May and the countryside has burgeoned with fresh green foliage. If only the temperature would rise it might feel like summer. However, 17 May brought the longed-for easing of Covid restrictions and the welcome resumption of face-to-face meetings. There are now some indoor church services (pages 18, 20). The new orthodox church of St Edmund held its opening service of thanksgiving on 14 April. The Parish Councils and the Reading Group can abandon Zoom. With face-to-face meetings planned the Reading Group would welcome new members (page 16). Covid 19 has not gone away so we still need to be cautious when meeting people. Granta Medical and the Councillors (pages 7, 10, 11) provide updates on the diminishing numbers of people infected and the back-up medical and financial services on offer. Love Abington will continue its valuable support to the community and thanks are due to the many volunteers who make this possible (page 6).

Bernie Talbot, the remarkably active chairman of Great Abington Parish Council, has stood down after 19 years in the role. The community owes him huge thanks for the leadership he provided especially in developing the Neighbourhood Plan and wise provision of new housing. Please note that there are now houses at £100k available and applications should be made by 13 June. Larkfield has a new community orchard and needs members of the community to maintain it (page 13).

The parish councils regularly provide us with information on where to send details of inadequate street lighting, potholes and similar problems. I am delighted to see yellow marks around several nasty potholes so remedial action will soon follow.

Congratulations to Hildersham for actively addressing biodiversity and environmental issues at the churchyard. The children have taken this to heart. The Abington churchyards are joining this initiative. (pages 5, 14).

Interestingly, page 4 discusses the ease with which we can fail to recognise our own racism.

Enjoy the new freedoms; keep safe.

From the Seven Churches

How could I have been so stupid?

I vividly remember my brother's surprise 60th birthday party, in the local village hall. Genuinely, he simply hadn't seen the surprise coming; and he was gracious enough to acknowledge this in his speech at the end.

"I just didn't realise that it was all being prepared? How could I have been so stupid? The answer came, from the back of the hall, "Years of practice, Brian!"

That the Church of England has an appalling track record of institutional racism burnt fiercely in the news some weeks ago. But like much 'shock'n'horror' news, by the next day or so it quickly spluttered out.

I guess most people really weren't surprised at the news. Especially, if like me you've had the good fortune to make close friends with black and brown people whom you've come to respect, and in whose judgement and honesty you completely trust. And you've become comfortable enough with each other to be able to ask them if they've ever experienced racism. And they look at you as if you've asked them if the earth really does go round the sun.

How could I have been so stupid, not to be more in touch with my own unconscious racial biases? Years of practice Alistair!

The important question then becomes, "Well, what to do about it?" The positive discrimination of ensuring that black and brown candidates are always shortlisted for jobs? Making sure you're especially nice to your neighbours of colour – hmm probably few opportunities here, locally? Yes, all these are good things.

Nevertheless, at the end of the day, as white, it's hard not to fall into the feeling of being accused of something that's a little bit unfair. What about that article you read on paler black people discriminating against darker black people; or the involvement of native Africans in the capturing and trading their own into slavery? Not that such excuses can ever exonerate inhumanity and gross inhumanity. But surely the discussion is more complicated - and fraught with difficulty and potentially heated and unpleasant; and we'd all rather it went away. After all, surely things are gradually improving?

The risk, as always, is that racism becomes yet another thing to kick into the long grass. And, then our racism just becomes yet more furtive, unprocessed and unacknowledged.

And that's not good enough. Certainly not good enough for Christians. Perhaps, because for Christians the concept of forgiveness is so overfamiliar, we forget how key the asking for, and the offering of forgiveness is to our faith. And yet 'forgiveness', when we start to unpack it can seem to throw up more questions than it answers. Indeed, it becomes a life-times exploration of learning the true impact of Jesus Christ's death and resurrection, for love of us, in our lives.

Forgiveness must be central to the work of reconciliation. But how in practice can/should/will forgiveness play out to bring about change for the better in our multicultural world with its years of stupidity, bad practice, and racism?

It's not exactly clear, I think. However, Christians might well reflect on the likelihood that this extraordinary and needed cultural change is the work of the Holy Spirit bringing in the Kingdom of God. And, at the very least, we must listen to the Spirit's promptings, and cooperate with God in where He is leading us.

Have you had your first Covid vaccination yet? If not, and you are in a cohort between 1 and 6, please contact us as soon as possible to arrange an appointment.

If you fall into one of the cohorts 7 to 12, please ring 119 or go to https://www.nhs.uk/conditions/coronavirus-covid-19/coronavirus-vaccination/ where you can directly book your first dose appointment at a central vaccination centre.

If you need to book your second dose, NHS England guidelines state that patients should return to the venue where they had their first vaccination, as the second dose will be allocated and sent to that original venue.

Covid-19 test if you have no symptoms?

All adults across Cambridgeshire and Peterborough can now get free, rapid COVID-19 tests/kits for home-testing. One in three people with Covid-19 don't have symptoms, so adults are being encouraged to take lateral flow tests twice a week to stop outbreaks and keep the virus in check.

Use NHS111 to book into A&E

Many people know they can contact NHS111 online or by phone if they need urgent health care or advice. But the service can now book time slots for you at A&E or at a minor injury unit, GP or pharmacy.

This new system is called NHS 111 First. To use it phone 111 or visit NHS111 online. If in doubt about the help you need, go to 111.nhs.uk

patients, copying in the GP, rather than the other way round.

Since the start of Covid the CPPG has helped shape how the hospital communicates with patients about potential delays, getting blood tests done locally, and changing to video or telephone appointments.

Lenja Bell, Macmillan Co-production Lead, based at Addenbrooke's, said: "Doctors and nurses are great at providing clinical expertise, but it is only by listening to people with lived experience of cancer that we can really provide a service which meets their needs."

Patients and carers can be involved as little or much as suits them at any particular time.

The CPPG is keen to reflect the diversity and demographics of patients and would particularly welcome members from the Black, Asian and Minority Ethnic and LGBT+ communities, plus anyone under 50 and representatives from the Armed Forces.

County and District Councils

District and County Councillors' Report – May 2021

A1307 Update

The process of upgrading the road continues, as you may well have seen, the installation of average speed cameras between Linton and Cardinals Green has commenced. The next scheme to be implemented will be the signalised crossing at Hildersham.

The local liaison forum meetings are still occurring. They are public so please do register to attend the forthcoming ones to have an input.

Covid

At time of writing there are only 22 people in hospital with Covid in Cambridgeshire with three in Addenbrookes. This is a huge improvement and will of course allow our hospitals to get back to treating people with other conditions, many of which are now very urgent.

The supplies of the Astra Zeneca, Moderna and Pfizer vaccines over May and June are limited but should increase significantly mid-June, hopefully in time for many of us to be ready for the summer holidays!

Over 90% of the over-75s have received both their jabs and over 51% of the over 50s.

We have seen some increase in transmission in South Cambs. and Cambridge City and there is still a possibility of further rise as lock down restrictions lessen. South Cambs. is currently at the national average rate of about 25 cases per 100,000 people.

The District Council still have a 'Covid Co-Ordinator' available to anyone that is in need of support – Vicky.hoover@scambs.gov.uk

Bus Capacity Issue

Many people, across the Linton division, have raised the issue of capacity of buses during peak periods. Now that schools and workplaces have reopened, it has meant a higher volume of bus users during morning and afternoon rush hours. Given that bus operators are obliged to socially distance their passengers, it has meant that buses are only operating at 50% capacity. This has caused some issues with people not being able to ride, especially if they're getting on 'down the line' when the bus is already full. Stagecoach have been made aware and some good news, they are suspending the Milton P&R service from 10 May to put more buses onto priority routes, which includes the 13 in our area, so things should be getting better, if still not perfect.

Business Grants

The Business Support team at SCDC have now given out over £11million in grants to 4834 businesses in the district, since November last year. These grants can be the difference between life and death for some businesses. The latest available grant is the Business Restart Grant -

Cambridgeshire Fire and Rescue Service

We want everyone to enjoy the sunny weather safely this summer. High temperatures and dry areas of land can be perfect conditions for a fire to spread. Something as simple as not stubbing a cigarette out properly, or using a disposable barbecue on grass, can start a fire that can get out of control quickly.

There are some simple steps we urge residents to take to help prevent an outdoor fire:

- 1. Use barbecues on a hard, flat surface, away from grass, shrubs or fencing.
- 2. Put disposable barbecues on bricks, do not place directly on grass.
- 3. Ensure cigarettes are completely out.
- 4. Do not throw cigarettes out of car windows onto grass verges or vegetation.
- 5. Do not leave glass bottles lying on the ground, the sun's rays reflect through the glass and can start a fire.
- 6. Talk to your children about the dangers of starting a fire.
