Letter from the Editor



On Monday 12 December we all awoke to find our villages covered with snow, accompanied by bitterly cold temperatures. It looked beautiful (see cover photo) but icy roads and footpaths compromised safety. On 19 December overnight warm air and rain washed all the snow away.

The Big Breakfast on 17 December provided welcome warmth and company. Remember that Jeremiah's Café is a warm place to go on a cold day (page 17).

The next community oil order will be made at the end of January (page 14).

The churches organised an excellent Christmas Tree Festival. They were also delighted to receive so many Christmas gifts donated for refugee children (pages 5, 17).

The Ukrainians who have made their homes in our area are taking steps to find work and to continue their education. There is a huge need for those still in Ukraine to receive warm clothes and bedding to help them survive the extreme cold, exacerbated by Russian destruction of power supplies. Having just had a taste of temperatures of -10°C we should understand and support the Rotary Club's collection of winter aid to send to Ukraine (page 5). Having completed the initial six-month arrangement for hosting Ukrainians there is now a need to find new hosts for some families (pages 7, 8).

The District and County Councils have been discussing the potential congestion charge for those driving into Cambridge. They also tell us of several grants being made to help with the high cost of living, and advise on ways to get help with poor housing. There are plans for electric charging hubs (pages 8-9).

This has been the season for special Christmas services in our churches and the new curate, Ben Brady has been officiating at many of them. The carol services on 19 December had to compete with the extraordinary, nail-biting football World Cup Final.

Now that all that excitement is over we face 2023 no doubt with some trepidation on account of the difficult financial outlook. It will be increasingly important that our villages foster the co-operative community spirit that saw us cope with Covid, and past experience provides hope for positivity.

On behalf of the churches in Abington and Hildersham, the Children's Church Council and Love Abington, we want to thank you from the bottom of our hearts for making such a difference to so many children's lives in Cambridgeshire this Christmas. Our appeal for Christmas gifts for refugees and children in emergency foster care in Cambridgeshire produced a response beyond our wildest dreams. On a cold, winter's afternoon in December, people arrived at St Mary's Little Abington and Holy Trinity Hildersham for the Advent tea with beautiful, thoughtful gifts which filled the large spaces around the Christmas trees in the two churches (see page 17). We collected well over 200 gifts and social services, coordinated by Jo Gilbert, needed three large cars to take them to the distribution point.

Our grateful thanks to Revd Ben Brady for housing the gifts at the Abington vicarage until they could be collected. Social Services were delighted because they were deeply concerned that these children would not be remembered at all this year. These children will never meet you but they will now know that there was someone out there who really cared and wanted them to feel loved at Christmas. Your gifts will be treasured. Ben said that it was a sobering experience listening to the people who came to collect the gifts. This year, social workers will also be able to give gifts to children who are living in abject food and fuel poverty as well as to the unaccompanied refugee children and children in foster care and children's homes.

A special thank you to all the young people, to Ben Brady, Mary Miles, Marilyn Broadhurst, Beatrix Spencer and Gill Talbot for all their time and effort in making this appeal a success.

We can offer you smoking cessation and our trained nurses will be happy to help you. Please ring us on 0300 234 5555 for further information and to arrange an appointment.

If you are over 16 and your BMI is greater than 25 you can access a free adult weight management service via our Social Navigation team. Please ring 01223 627745 or email granta.socialnavigator@nhs.net Please give the team your current weight and height.

"In 2023 I would like to stay healthy"

If you are aged between 40 and 74 and do not have a pre-existing long term medical condition, you may be eligible for a free NHS Health Check. Please ring us on 0300 234 5555 for further information and to book an appointment.

Also, are you up to date with the vaccinations you are eligible for, e.g. flu, shingles, pneumonia? If you are unsure please do not hesitate to contact us and we can check for you.

Call for winter aid for Ukraine refugees from Saffron Walden Rotary

A collection of winter items for the people of Ukraine is to be held on Saturday 14 January at Abington Primary School car park from 9.00am until 1.00pm. It is being supported by Guy Underwood, headmaster and Revd. Ian McColl of the Granta Churches.

The on-going conflict in Ukraine creates continuing hardship for those displaced and affected by the war. The current need is for good warm clothing and thermal garments, blankets, duvets and sleeping bags, towels, sheets and bedding items, toiletries and cleaning materials, medical supplies - bandages, plasters and activity games for children.

Tony Collett of Rotary in Saffron Walden will have a lorry parked on the playground in the High Street and with others will be on-hand to take items from cars. Cash donations to assist in transportation costs are also accepted and these can also be made at the Rotary collection point in cash or by credit card on 14 January. 'As the war continues more is still needed and it's really comforting having Rotarians on our side to fight this massive problem' said Alan Hilliar co-founder of UK-Aid.

Tony says, 'call me on 01223 893 447 if you want me to collect items and by the way Jeremiah's Café at the Abington Institute will be open from 10.00am for those who would like a winter warmer'.

UKRAINIAN COMMUNITY IN ABINGTON

All members of the Ukrainian community in Abington are now well established and becoming independent economically and socially. Of the 11 who are in employment three are working remotely when the electricity is available in Ukraine, two are working in Cambridge, five are working in Abington and Hildersham and one is working for South Cambs. District Council.

Additionally, the younger members are studying remotely when electricity is available in Ukraine. One young person has a job in Abington and Cambridge and also studies remotely at a Ukrainian University, again depending on the availability of electricity in Ukraine.

The 10 villages in the Granta4Ukraine support group are now hosting 207 guests via 80 households.

South Cambs. has issued 808 visas and 750 guests have arrived.

The Homes for Ukraine scheme is now at a critical stage. The initial agreement was that hosts would provide a home for 6 months. In South Cambs. around 20% of current hosts are unable to continue with the scheme so there is a need for new host households. Anyone who can assist with this should text ROOM to 88802. The Ukrainian community in Abington is not affected by this situation. Also see page 9.

Some Ukrainians in neighbouring villages are now expressing their independence and confidence by seeking rental properties.

There is a great need for warm winter clothing both locally and in Ukraine. Locally donations can be received at the Free Church in Sawston on Thursday and Friday between 4pm and 6pm. Items for Ukraine can be sent via the Rotary Club of Saffron Walden details at https://rotary-sw.org NOTE: the Arthur Rank warehouse in Pampisford will no longer accept donations for mums4Ukraine. Christmas in Ukraine is quite complicated and details are on page 14. Christmas time is essentially a family event. All the guests in Abington will be separated from their extended families and five will be separated from their close family. This will obviously produce some strong emotions because it was hoped that displaced Ukrainians could return to their homeland after six months, but as this now seems unlikely Abington will be their Christmas 2022 homeland where they can experience peace and the safety of the village community.

District and County Councillor's Report December 2022

'Making Connections' Consultation A 'Sustainable Travel Zone' road user charge has been proposed by the Greater Cambridge Partnership (the body currently implementing the upgrades to the A1307) for private vehicles between 7am and 7pm on weekdays. The plans aim to improve public transport, reduce congestion in the city and help the environment through lower emissions.

A £5 congestion charge to drive into and around Cambridge is being considered as part of a 'once in a generation' plan to shake up how people travel during the working week. These proposals are now for public consultation. It is <u>vitally</u> important that as many people as possible respond directly with their views. It will be one of the largest decisions that will affect the way that we travel in and out of Cambridge for generations to come.

The consultation, plus all the related documents, can be seen here - https://consultcambs.uk.engagementhq.com/making-connections-2022 - it is important to read the documents, as there is a lot of misinformation and personal opinion in the media.

A1307 Update Most of the work is complete but the schemes to be implemented are:

- 1. Completion of the new footpath from Hildersham to Dalehead Foods due Spring 2023
- 2. The new roundabout on the A1307 at the end of Bartlow Road, Linton due Spring 2023
- 3. Remodelling of the highly dangerous Dean Road junction on the A1307 due Spring 2023
- 4. The implementation of the 'Greenway', the non-motorised route between Linton and Cambridge. The route through Abington, is still TBD. The preferred route is likely to be via Pampisford Road and not through the village centre.

Cost of Living Support & Community Chest SCDC's Community Chest fund provides grants to voluntary and community sector groups, charities and public sector bodies wishing to improve quality of life locally. Criteria have been expanded to allow bids that include contributions for any project that has a positive impact for communities related to the cost-of-living crisis. Parish Councils of any size can now place grant bids. A ringfenced total sum of £20,000 has been made available for these new Community Chest grant applications, provided by the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Integrated Care System, to ensure support is co-ordinated effectively and directed at those in need locally this winter - https://www.scambs.gov.uk/community-safety-and-health/grants/community-chest-grants/

South Cambs. District Council also has a cost of living 'Go Fund Me' page that is taking donations to use to purchase items needed to assist those that need support over the winter months - https://www.scambs.gov.uk/emergency-go-fund-me-page-will-help-residents-struggling-in-the-cost-of-living-crisis/

Help for Households campaign – social tariffs The government has worked with a range of Internet Service Providers (IPSs) and Mobile Network Operators (MNOs) to deliver low-cost broadband and phone service packages, called social tariffs, for those on low incomes. Social tariffs are available for people claiming Universal Credit, Pension Credit and some other benefits, with some providers offering deals from £15 a month.

Warm Home Discount scheme reopened The Warm Home Discount scheme will provide a discount of £150 off electricity bills for three million low-income households this winter. Most households will receive the discount automatically. The government has launched a new online tool, to make it easier for the public to check if they are eligible. The online tool will guide customers through the eligibility criteria in England and Wales, asking questions about electricity supply, the benefits they receive and characteristics of their property. All customers will receive a letter between November and mid-January 2023 confirming their eligibility. Payment will be made automatically through energy suppliers by March 2023.

The government is also writing to customers who may be eligible, advising them to use the tool linked below to check eligibility, and to use the helpline for particularly complex cases. https://www.gov.uk/the-warm-home-discount-scheme

Linton Warm Hubs - Cambridgeshire ACRE and South Cambs. District Council are working with communities across the district to open Warm Hubs to help people struggling with fuel cost or just wanting an opportunity to get together. There are now 20 up and running with another seven on the way. Linton has opened its first two Warm Hubs, these are: St Marys Church - Thursday 11am - 2pm and Linton Free Church - Tuesday 1 - 4pm. Ukraine - new hosts for guests needed -Cambridge City and South Cambs. have between them about 500 hosts for Ukraine guests. With the war in Ukraine continuing, the six-month hosting arrangements need to be renewed, though not all hosts can do so. We need new homes for about 200 people, so the councils have launched the GOT A SPARE interested, ROOM campaign. lf you are please text ROOM to 88802. https://www.scambs.gov.uk/support-for-ukraine-it-all-starts-with-a-spare-room/

Electric Vehicle Charging The District Council has introduced a grant of up to £5,000 per application for electric vehicle charging points on community/public buildings within the district. It's a great opportunity to expand our electric charging network and make our area more accessible for those wanting to travel here via electric vehicle.

Housing Issues If you rent a home in the private sector, we would urge you to seek help from the District Council if mould or associated issues are not resolved by your landlord. In South Cambridgeshire, the District Council has a role in ensuring that homes in the private sector and the Council's own properties do not contain health hazards. Most properties within the private rented sector in the district are in good condition, but the Council's Environmental Health team investigates any complaints. Private Sector and Housing Association tenants can complain about the condition of their home by emailing env.health@scambs.gov.uk. The Council has the power to take appropriate enforcement action to resolve issues. This could include writing to the landlord to ensure the issue is resolved. The Council can also serve a legal notice to instruct works to be carried out. The District Council manages around 5,500 Council homes and takes reports of mould in any of them extremely seriously. Do not hesitate to contact Henry or John if you have an unresolved issue in your Council house.

Six Free Trees For the third year running South Cambs. is offering free trees to parish councils across the district to help provide homes and food for wildlife and combat climate change. The Six Free Trees campaign has seen 390 trees planted across South Cambridgeshire since its launch in 2019. CCC business planning for 2023-24 The County Council faces a budget gap of about £29 million due to inflation. Much work has been done to close that gap before the February budget meeting, but a £13 Million gap remains. Detailed papers on service areas will go to December committees at the County Council.

Christmas and New Year Holiday in Ukraine

Traditionally the Ukrainian Christmas starts on 6 January with Christmas Eve and is celebrated on 7 January as reckoned by the Julian Calendar. The festive season in Ukraine lasts one month – from St Nikolaus' Day (Magic Night) on 19 December and ends on 19 January, the date of the Feast of Epiphany. The Orthodox Church in Ukraine tends to follow the Julian Calendar. The Catholic Church tends to follow the Gregorian Calendar, with Christmas Day celebrated on 25 December.

Since 2017, both dates mentioned above have been recognised as Christmas Days and official holidays. The decision on when to celebrate is made by communities.

Advent is important for those fasting for a month before Christmas. The final fasting day is Christmas Eve - Sviatyi Vechir, (a Holy Evening). This can involve traditional house and table decorations with a symbolic sheaf of wheat, Didukh (Grandfather Spirit). Wisps of hay can also be present on the table as a reminder of the Bethlehem Manger.

To celebrate, people sing Koliadky (carols). In villages they do it walking from house to house to greet their neighbours.

In some regions and some traditional households Kolach (Christmas Bread) is placed in the centre of the table. The bread is braided into a ring, and three such rings are placed one on top of the other with a candle in the centre of the top one. The three rings symbolise the Trinity and the circular form represents Eternity.

The whole family gathers for dinner. When the children see the first star (of Bethlehem) in the evening sky, the dinner may begin.

The dinner comprises 12 dishes, which may vary regionally or by preference. They do not contain meat, milk or eggs because the period of fasting does not finish until Christmas Day. Each dish is dedicated to one of Christ's Apostles.

The first main dish is Kutia "God's Food" (sweet grain pudding that comprises boiled wheat, poppy seed and honey.)

Then comes Borshch (beet soup) with Vushka (boiled dumplings filled with chopped mushrooms and onions).

Then a variety of fish – baked, broiled, fried, cold in aspic, fish balls, marinated herring and so on.

Next is Varenyky (boiled dumplings filled with cabbage, potatoes, buckwheat grains or prunes). There are also Holubtsi (stuffed cabbage) and the supper ends with Uzvar "God's Drink"(a traditional drink of 12 different stewed fruits although a mix of apples, pears and perhaps plums are acceptable)

The so-called Old New Year is 14 January. January 13th is Malanka, a Ukrainian Folk Holiday which, according to the Julian Calendar, is New Year's Eve.

However, the Gregorian Calendar is used for secular and official celebrations so 31 December and 1 January are the New Year festivities for many, just as everywhere in Europe.

Another holiday celebration is St Basil's Day which is when gifts are given to children, 2 January is the Gregorian Calendar date mainly celebrated in East Ukraine whereas 14 January is the Julian Calendar date, mainly in the West of the country. Traditionally Vasilopita, a rich bread baked with a coin inside, is served.
