Letter from the Editor

Facing the challenges of the high cost of living, climate change, industrial action and war in Europe, we need to find reasons for hope. Page 4 suggests that recognising the vulnerability of members of the community and their need of each other can provide that hope. Our ongoing community responses to the needs of others demonstrate its effectiveness. Page 5 records gratitude for the many people, including children, who have made donations to the foodbanks in the churches. These are being well used. Operation Christmas Child received over 15,000 boxes of gifts to distribute to needy children. The appeal for warm clothing and bedding to send to Ukraine met with an overwhelming response. The local Ukrainian community organised a holiday celebration meal for their UK hosts (Pages 5, 6, 7).

Reports from councillors (pages 8-9,15-17) include a new local plan for an extra 8,000 houses, moves for more 20mph schemes, action on pollution and electric charging points and ways to report the increasing damage caused by potholes.

February brings an invitation to the Cricket Club's Indoor Nets and to Pancake Tuesday, another special Abington Lunch and plans for events in the spring, not least the Coronation.

From the Seven Churches

When our village churches were first built, some six or seven hundred years ago, Christmas was a season of celebration and feasting that lasted for well over a month. Officially the festivities ended on 2 February, the Feast of Candlemas.

How things have changed. We know now that Christmas is over when Easter chocolates start appearing on the supermarket shelves early in January!

The Bible reading for Candlemas records the words of an old, holy man who finds the child Jesus in the Temple in Jerusalem. Simeon thanks God for this gift of having at last seen the child destined to be a "light of revelation" and hope to the world, and so he can die in peace. Candlemas gets its name from the candles, the lights people would bring to church on that day, to be blessed and lit through the long dark days of winter and deprivations of Lent before Easter finally arrived.

Yet for us, this February, finding reasonable things to hope for may seem something of a stretch.

Our forebears endured precarious lives. But in our generation, we have learned to take for granted predictable seasonal weather, and steady progress on many fronts: an increased standard of living, longer healthier lives, and an increasingly democratic world. And all this progress probably not driven by a God in the sky as much as by the science and reason which have made us believe that we are the masters of our own destiny.

However, there's much happening in the world today to make us wonder if the progress we enjoyed is stalling. The relationships within, and between, nations are again creaking badly. And we are only promised increasingly severe weather events and uncertain seasonal patterns.

Falling back on the certainties of our ancestors isn't an option. So, is there anything we might still learn from the light and hope of Candlemas, within the whole pattern of the Christian year, to help sustain us in our uncertain times? Things that perhaps our village forebears, in their lives bound more closely together, took for granted. But in a world of rivalry, greed and increasing suspicion things that we fail to see. I think there is.

In our community, we all **need** each other. And to 'make it' with each other we need the light of seeing our mutual vulnerabilities, and the light of compassion and sacrifice, and the light to find joy in each other as the only underpinning to give our lives real meaning and true hope.

UKRAINIAN COMMUNITY IN ABINGTON

Another person joined the Abington Ukrainian Community in January which makes a total

of 17 in eight hosting households.

On 7 January in the Institute the Abington Ukrainian community hosted a holiday celebration for their Abington hosts. This was an opportunity to sample 14 examples of traditional Ukrainian cuisine that celebrates the holiday season. Forty people attended and the opening activity was the Ukrainian community singing traditional Ukrainian carols. The atmosphere was one of joyous unity as a start to 2023.

Another impressive event was on 14 January when the Rotary Club of Saffron Walden parked a lorry at the school to collect "warm items" for Ukraine. The lorry was filled and the small meeting room in the Institute was also filled with items donated by the village. A truly compassionate response from the local community expressing an understanding of the needs of vulnerable citizens in Ukraine.

The donated items will be sorted and prepared for transport by UK Aid and will then be

taken to Poland and Moldova where the Rotary Clubs will distribute the donations to Rotary Clubs in Ukraine that have identified the locations where the need is critical.

Clothing items can be donated locally at the Sawston Free Church on Thursday and Friday between 4 and 6pm.

18 million Ukrainian citizens are affected by the conflict.

13 million have fled their homes.

10 million have fled from Ukraine.

8 million are displaced within the country.

3 million have returned to "their homeland".

5 million have needed emergency relief items.

8 million have needed emergency access to clean water.

626,000 have needed emergency financial support.

In the UK the Red Cross has supported 10,000 displaced Ukrainians.

In the UK the Red Cross has provided £1million of emergency funds for displaced Ukrainians.

District and County Councillors' Report January 2023

Making Connections Consultation

Thank you to all those who fed their views into the Greater Cambridge Partnership's public consultation on their proposals to improve public transport in our area with the introduction of a sustainable travel zone that would be funded via a congestion charge.

There were record numbers of responses to this, as hoped, as it is, in our opinion, one of the most important consultations that we'll be asked to respond to. There were in the region of 24,000 responses, which equates to around 15% of the entire population of South Cambridgeshire (this doesn't sound like a lot, but it is!).

Local Plan

The Local Plan (the District Council's process of identifying sustainable locations for housing and economic development within South Cambridgeshire and Cambridge City for the next 30 years) is moving forward. The latest update is that due to the very fast economic growth in the area (the predicted job growth has already been achieved halfway through the current Local Plan) the government-set formula for calculating housing need has had to be reassessed. Using the new calculation, it is now necessary to find a place for a further 8,000 houses on top of what has already been allocated. This is likely to mean either another new town in the district, or lots of small to medium-sized developments on the edge of existing settlements/villages as well as in the Green Belt.

Another complication is that the Environment Agency is now taking quite a hard line on water supply. They are saying that the area currently doesn't have enough water supply to fulfil the <u>current</u> Local Plan, let alone the emerging one. There is a plan to use Grafham Water's supply, but this isn't currently planned to come online until 2027.

So, not a straightforward predicament but do keep watching this space as the situation develops.

Cost of Living support & Community Chest

SCDC's Community Chest fund provides grants to voluntary and community sector groups, charities and public sector bodies wishing to further improve quality of life locally. Criteria have been expanded to allow bids that include contributions for any project that has a positive impact for communities related to the cost-of-living crisis. Parish Councils of any size can also now place grant bids. A ring-fenced total sum of £20,000 has been made available for these new Community Chest grant applications, provided by the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Integrated Care System, to ensure support is coordinated effectively and directed at those in need locally this winter: - www.scambs.gov.uk/community-safety-and-health/grants/community-chest-grants/

POPs in WUDS

Persistent organic pollutants (POPs) are found in various waste upholstered domestic seating (WUDS) such as sofas and upholstered dining chairs. Such materials should not be landfilled.

The law against landfilling POPs was introduced in 2007, but the Environment Agency recently announced it would become more rigorous in its enforcement. The Environment Agency declared in August 2022 that it would soon expect councils to cease landfilling upholstered seating, and to incinerate it instead. It published its Final Regulatory Position Statements on this matter on Monday 19 December 2022, with implementation starting on Sunday 1 January 2023.

The short notice over Christmas has provided little time to organise incineration capacity, and the County Council is therefore seeking an extension of at least a month while it works through options and liaises with its waste contractor Thalia (formerly Amey) and with the District Councils that collect Cambridgeshire's waste. This does however mean that from 1 January the Council will not be able to dispose of soft furnishings until a method of disposal acceptable to the Environment Agency has been identified and set up.

The Highways & Transport Committee at the County Council approved the changes to the Council's policy on 20mph speed limits outlined in previous reports. The proposed timetable for applications for funding new 20mph speed limits is as follows.

- Go live with application process online for new schemes (February 2023)
- Application period (February to April 2023)
- Prioritisation (May to June 2023)
- Committee report for approval (July 2023)
- Programming and delivery of schemes (August 2023 onwards)

King Charles III Coronation Street Parties

The Council has published guidance for local groups seeking to organise street parties and highways events to mark the coronation of King Charles III in May 2023. All street party applications must be received by the County Council at least eight weeks in advance (Friday 10 March 2023) via the Council's website. Highway Events applications must be submitted at least twelve weeks in advance (Friday 10 February 2023).

Ukraine – new hosts needed for guests

Cambridge City and South Cambs. have between them about 500 hosts for Ukrainian guests. With the war in Ukraine continuing, the six-month hosting arrangements have had to be renewed, though not all hosts are able to do so. Anyone who might be able to provide a spare room for a guest from Ukraine is asked to get in touch with SCDC. We need new homes for about 200 people. The District Council has introduced a grant of up to £5,000 per application for electric vehicle charging points on community/public buildings within the district. Abington & Hildersham Women's Institute

On the night of our January meeting the rocket launch from Cornwall to send the first satellites from British soil into space unfortunately failed, but our speaker, Jonathan Clough from the Institute of Astronomy, University of Cambridge, took us into the skies with fascinating scenes of the planets and their associated circling moons and stars. Blue and blue-white stars are bigger, brighter, hotter and younger (live 15 – 20 million years!), while yellow stars, like our sun, are cooler and middle-aged. Red dwarfs are tiny and dim and can only be seen with a powerful telescope. We ventured out onto the balcony to see Jupiter and Mars and some stars, but unfortunately the clouds obscured much of the night sky.

Four resolutions had been shortlisted for this year's national WI campaign and our votes were overwhelmingly in favour of "Online gambling harm: time for action". Online gambling profits (£5.3 billion in 2019) are increasing, while the Gambling Commission has not adjusted to online/mobile technological changes. This resolution seeks updated regulation to address these issues as well as increased support for those affected by problem gambling, particularly women and children. We have to wait for the NFWI meeting in June to see if other WI members vote for this resolution but it is always good to raise awareness amongst ourselves.

Hildersham Parish Council

Report on the Hildersham Parish Council meeting held on 10 January 2023

David Mercer explained that he had met a CCC Highway officer who highlighted that the width of Back Road at the Back Road/High Street point was dangerous, noted that the white lines had not been painted properly, and suggested that the description "dangerous junction" be inserted in the application. Various remedies were discussed including a 20-mph speed limit, moving the signs back, or a four-way Give Way junction. David Mercer submitted the Local Highway Initiative application form to fund improvements with a request for a four-way Give Way junction.

A four-page Gardens Questionnaire was printed and delivered to all village households with the aim of creating a Nature Recovery Plan for Hildersham. Councillors had now received a letter explaining what information had been received and suggesting that the Hildersham Parish Council grass-cutting programme be altered to accommodate and encourage the various red-list species that had been noted. It is hoped that further investigation will take place in the spring.

Councillors selected the stand for the new locally designed footpath map from the three quotations obtained. It is hoped that the sign will be erected in the next few months.

A Passionate plea for our Protected Verges

The grass verges on either side of Bourn Bridge Road from leading toward Newmarket Road are designated Protected Verges. This status was confirmed in 2004 after a lot of work by the Naturewatch Group. Since then, these verges have flourished and have been a source of over 30 species of flowers and grasses together with numerous insects and small mammals. Every year recordings are made, and the results can be seen in the Naturewatch Annual Report.

Until about three years ago these verges provided a wonderful sight each year and careful mowing is also organised. However, after a devastatingly dry summer in 2022 and erosion from footfall alongside the eastern verge the results are not good. These verges are a very important part of our natural environment, providing wildlife corridors and a large variety of flora that attracts diversity. Please try not to walk on the verges. The road is narrow and there is a lot of speeding but for safety just step briefly onto the verge and then return to the road.

We are all in a difficult place at the moment and, because of this, the most important issue of the FUTURE of our PLANET is in danger of being forgotten. This is devastating. We can all do our bit in many ways that may seem small but collectively add up to something worthwhile. Think of your children, grandchildren and their children and help to offer them a future.
