From the Seven Churches

Summer can be a wonderful time for celebrations! At the time of writing, I'm looking forward to taking my children to the June Revels at the Meadow Primary School, Balsham, a really enjoyable occasion. We also have a number of weddings to look forward to in our group of churches over the summer. I feel wedding celebrations can have a ripple effect of joy in the community around them; a celebration of love, hope and faith that is both deeply personal and draws in a community of people who promise to uphold the couple in their lives together.

Then there are the numerous summer festivals. I'm a particular fan of the Christian festival Greenbelt, held on the August bank holiday weekend, with its focus on arts, activism and faith. We've been going as a family for many years and in the words of Pádraig Ó Tuama, an Irish poet and theologian who regularly speaks at Greenbelt, it provides for many a 'sacrament of green'. It also creates, for those few days around that bank holiday weekend, a special community that debates, prays, and enjoys a party together!

Indeed, the Christian faith has long been rooted in this kind of community. Rowan Williams, the former Archbishop of Canterbury, said that when reading the gospels, you sometimes get the impression that if anywhere in ancient Galilee you heard a loud noise and a lot of laughter and talking and singing, you could be reasonably sure Jesus of Nazareth was nearby. His indiscriminate generosity and willingness to mix with people considered unsuitable by some parts of his society were vividly recollected by the gospel writers. Jesus sought out company, and the effect of his presence was to create a celebration, to bind people together.

Speaking of celebrating community, I'm delighted to announce that Hannah Threlfall, whom some of you may know as an ordinand, or minister-in-training, has recently taken on the role of Community Minister in our parishes for two days a week. This role will include pastoral care for people and supporting local initiatives that encourage community, compassion and faith. Our ministry team looks forward to supporting Hannah in this exciting new role. Please do ask Hannah more about it if you see her around. Revd lain McColl

News from the Pews

Sadly, in this month's news we report the passing of three well-known and loved members of our community, all of whom will be remembered for a very long time. Our thoughts and prayers are with their families at this sad time.

David William Percival, 'Dave'. Dave passed away on 15 May following a long illness where he showed huge endurance throughout. Following a motorcycle accident at the age of 17, Dave spent the rest of his life in a wheelchair. This accident encouraged him to spend his life raising money for various charities and taking part in numerous challenges himself with great tenacity. His funeral took place at the Cam Valley Crematorium on 6 June with many friends and relatives attending. It was a moving ceremony with Dave himself sending a final message of love to his family and beloved wife Bronwen via video.

Bronwen writes: 'As Dave's wife, I would like to express my deepest and most sincere thanks to all the wonderful people of the Abingtons who have supported Dave and myself since we moved here in 2008. To see so many neighbours and friends from the villages at his funeral was truly moving. Despite Dave's periods of poor health he always remained positive and cheerful and used to love to stop and chat to people in the villages when he was out on his mobility scooter walking our dog. He very much enjoyed his time on Great Abington Parish Council and used to be so proud to live somewhere that had such a strong supporting community and a true desire to love and help thy neighbour. I would especially like to thank those at Love Abington, Rosemary and Len Mead, the Revd Ben Brady and Claire and Kim, our former parish nurses. Also all the friends who came round to keep Dave company when I needed to go out and he was too poorly to be left alone and to Annie who took on the responsibility of walking Zack in the weeks leading up to and following Dave's death. I know that your friendship, support and kindness to me will be ongoing and I thank each and every one of you for that too.'

William (Bill) Bishop. Bill passed away on 25 April. Bill and his wife Mary moved to West Field in 1980 when it was still under construction, and lived there for 41 years. Sadly Mary passed away in 2010, after battling with a recurrence of breast cancer. Bill continued to live in Abington until the difficult decision was made to move to a care home in Norwich, near to his nephew Nick, in 2021. He always enjoyed visits to The Three Tuns to meet and chat with friends, and continued to visit from Norwich every couple of months with help from his nephew and friends Teresa and John, until ill-health and frailty prevented him. Bill claimed to be The Three Tuns' most loyal customer, having first been a customer in 1946 when he was served a soft drink while camping with the Cub Scouts! Both Bill and Mary worked at TWI. Bill working in the printing section inspired him to move to Plumridge Printers, where he worked for 30 years until his retirement in 2000. His funeral was held in Little Abington Church on 14 June followed by interment with Mary in the graveyard. Bill was a very positive, jovial and friendly man and is very sadly missed by all his family and friends.

Dee Young. Dee was only 41 years old when she passed away on 13 May. Dee leaves a daughter, Ellie, whom she lived with in Church Close. Members of Love Abington helped in various ways to support Dee throughout her illness along with her mother, Jackie. Love Abington and members of the community helped Jackie arrange

a wake in the Village Institute, epitomising the work of Love Abington and village friendship.

Jackie Palmer, Dee's mother, writes: 'A lot of you know that my daughter Dee Young recently passed away after fighting cancer for the past year. While I was nursing my daughter, a lot of the village rallied round to offer support and any help they could. I was absolutely overwhelmed by the love, kindness and support that the people of Abington showed to my daughter and myself while I was nursing her at home. I would like to thank Guy, who brought a pony round to see her as she had a love of horses, and Jayne and Andy Gambie who really supported and looked after us. I would also like to thank Rosemary Mead and Tony Orgee, who kindly gave advice and help for some difficult decisions that needed to be made. I would also like to take this opportunity to thank everyone who came to Dee's funeral and the gettogether afterwards and again would like to thank Rosemary Mead and Carol who organised the hall and refreshments for us.

Abington is a beautiful village which my daughter absolutely loved living in, and I can certainly see why. You are all kind caring people who were there for us in the most difficult circumstances and I was amazed by the sense of community there is in Abington. Rotary appeal for Ukraine

A collection for the people of Ukraine will be held by Saffron Walden Rotary on Saturday 15 July from 9.00am until 12.30pm at the Abington School playground, as in the previous two collections. There is a dire need for basic food, household, toiletries and health supplies. As the war continues families are losing their homes and possessions and are often without a breadwinner for the family. This creates a need for everyday food items, shoes, clothes, especially underwear, toiletries, all types of personal washing and shampoo items, sanitary towels and sanitary pads. Items for children include nappies for babies and colouring books and school supplies for young children.

The aid that the Rotary Club has been collecting over the last year is delivered to the Felsted based charity UK-Aid, which takes it to distribution centres in Moldova and Ukraine for the benefit of refugee and dispossessed families in those countries. Many hundreds of families have been helped, but many more are still in need.

Cash donations to assist in transportation costs are also accepted and these can also be made at the Rotary collection point in cash or by credit card on 15 July.

The collections at Abington have received tremendous support from local people and those from surrounding villages so it is hoped that we will get a good response again for those living in such hardship.

Rotary Saffron Walden is very appreciative of all the support it gets in its many different fundraising efforts. Tony Collett

District and County Councillors' Report June 2023

Greater Cambridge Partnership – sustainable travel zone consultation results

The results of the consultation were published at the end of May. With more than 24,000 responses, this has been a mammoth task and has produced a mountain of data. The headlines are:

- Over 70% want to see improved public transport
- 58% are against the charging fee for the proposals as they stand.

What happens now? The GCP Assembly and Board will review the results and look at options for changing the proposals in the light of the consultation. There will then be further discussion with the Mayor, who has responsibility for transport policy, and with the County Council, which is the Highways Authority. This will take some time, probably running into the autumn. We hope that this will result in new proposals that will be more acceptable to the public. The government also has to agree the way forward so that the initial funding of £50 million can be released and the improvements to the transport system can start going ahead. The total funding available will be around £200 million. This is an opportunity that is unlikely to come again if some form of congestion charging is not adopted. A1307 works

Work continues on the upgrades to the road and the next scheme to be implemented is the roundabout at the Bartlow Road, Linton crossing, which started in early May and is due to go on for about 40 weeks. Four-day week trial

This District Council has recently taken a decision to extend its four-day week trial to its bin crews, meaning that they will only collect bins between Tuesday and Friday each week. This will mean a change in collection day for our area, where the bins are collected on a Monday. This will be actioned at the end of the summer period, so please do keep your eyes peeled for the notices.

Resurfaced roads

Some of our communities have been lucky enough to get roads in their parishes resurfaced. If you're wondering why yours hasn't been, it's likely that the roads prioritised were either in a very bad state, or had preventative work done to them to stop them falling into serious disrepair. If you feel that your road should be included in the forward plan to be resurfaced, contact Henry and he can put a proposal forward to the local Highways Department on your behalf.

Potholes

We reported last month on the pothole situation and the pressure that the Highways Department was under. This month we have some figures for you. Since Christmas, Highways has filled in 27,000 potholes with another 10,000 to go and is fixing roughly 2,500 per week – so if no more reports come in, we would be pothole-free in a month. However, this is unlikely to be the case as new reports are coming in all the time but due to the better weather at a much slower rate.



National flu immunisation programme 2023

Eligibility for the free NHS flu vaccination is changing. This year the free NHS flu vaccine will not be offered to over 50s. Instead the following people will be invited:

- those aged 65 years and over
- those aged 6 months to under 65 years in clinical risk groups
- pregnant women
- all children aged 2 or 3 years on 31 August 2023
- primary school aged children (from Reception to Year 6)
- those in long-stay residential care homes

• carers in receipt of carer's allowance, or those who are the main carer of an elderly or disabled person

close contacts of immunocompromised individuals

• frontline workers in a social care setting without an employer-led occupational health scheme, including those working for a registered residential care or nursing home, registered domiciliary care providers, voluntary managed hospice providers and those who are employed by those who receive direct payments (personal budgets) or Personal Health budgets, such as Personal Assistants.
