From the Seven Churches

At the time of writing, I am feeling grateful for the warmth and beauty of early autumn and looking forward to a variety of celebrations in our parishes. I'm delighted we will be celebrating two weddings in early and mid-autumn, and looking forward once more to Harvest Festivals in our churches. Harvest festivals in this country can be traced back to the 1840s when, in recognition of the many 'Harvest Home' celebrations, the church began to include an annual Harvest thanksgiving service in early October. This was often accompanied by bringing gifts of fresh produce and other food to church, and became an important way of celebrating the season.

Our Harvest Festivals in church nowadays are usually celebrated sometime in early- to midautumn. They are times when we give thanks for the many gifts of God and reflect on how we should seek to be generous in Christ's name. During our Harvest Festivals this year we will be asking for donations of non-perishable food towards the foodbank run by Reach in Haverhill and reflecting on the daily importance of gratitude and of being cheerful givers. We hope to keep in mind the kind of generosity the Apostle Paul commended in his second letter to the church in Corinth, where he encouraged cheerful generosity and linked this to praise and thanksgiving.

The medieval Christian theologian and mystic, Meister Eckhart, reputedly said, 'If the only prayer you said was thank you, that would be enough.' Showing gratitude and praise is at the heart of the Christian faith and can transform a sense of ethical duty into the work of grateful hands and hearts. Harvest thanksgiving, then, can remind us that a daily practice of gratitude and praise can charge our lives with greater purpose, joy and wonder, as well as moving us to serve those in need. Holding any event in our village involves a lot of work behind the scenes, so we would like to thank Mak and Bea at the Village Stores for selling tickets, Tim Grout for holding fort at the entrance door, the unnamed person who kindly donated all the interval drinks and finally Glyn Hall, who provided lighting for the car park and tackled various other jobs. All our helpers at events are important to us and hugely appreciated; we couldn't manage without them.

Autumn appeal for Little Abington churchyard

Our churchyard contains not only the graves and memorial stones of generations of village residents but also beautiful trees, wildflowers and wildlife. The large yew tree is reportedly the oldest in Cambridgeshire. The five benches donated in memory of loved ones are used by many to sit and enjoy the peace of the churchyard surroundings and well-behaved dogs are welcome here. We really appreciate the care and efforts of the families and friends who regularly tend the graves of their loved ones and KA Gardening Services do their best to keep the grass areas under control (each cut alone costs £150). However, the time has come for more extensive maintenance and upkeep, such as tree surgery, hedge-cutting and attention to monuments. We would welcome any offers of help to keep the churchyard tidy but need to pay specialists for tree surgery. To raise funds for this work we will be holding a sale of plants and cakes outside the Village Institute on Saturday

7 October, 9.30–11.30am. If you can help by donating plants or cakes, please bring them along that morning or contact the Little Abington Churchwardens (see back page).

Funeral

The funeral of Maureen Brenda Harper, who died aged 94 on 5 August, took place at Sawston Catholic Church, where Maureen was a regular worshipper. The funeral was followed in the afternoon by a short service in Little Abington Church where the Committal took place in the churchyard. Maureen was a deeply respected member of the community, especially on the LSA where she and her husband David lived for many years. Our thoughts and prayers are with Maureen's children, Jonathan, Nick, Mike, Chris and Clare, her grandchildren, Gareth, Matthew, Karl, Daniel, Adam, Louisa, Kaya, Abigail, Charlotte, Tom and Ben, and her seven great-grandchildren (an eighth is expected shortly).

Charlotte Harper, Maureen's granddaughter, writes: On 6 September, friends and family joined in two services between St Philip Howard Parish Church and Little Abington's St Mary's to celebrate the life of Maureen Harper of South Road, Great Abington.

Maureen was born in Bath on 17 April 1929. Her childhood was spent happily in Melksham, Wiltshire, where her family ran a furniture shop. An only child, Maureen fondly remembered a childhood of lone adventuring on her bicycle and enjoying the company of dogs, a pony, and her guinea pigs. It was during her education at St Mary's Convent, Bratton, that Maureen's lifelong commitment to her faith began.

Despite the friction of their religious difference, Maureen married David Harper in 1955 following a last-minute invitation to his 21st birthday. After the birth of their first child, the couple took on the tenancy of 27 South Road in 1959, marking the beginning of their young family's life together as farmers.

Retirement gave Maureen the opportunity to steep herself thoroughly in volunteering for the benefit of the church, village and international community. In the 1990s, she began delivering the Eucharist to the housebound of the parish and visiting the Catholic patients at Addenbrooke's. She also performed readings at weekly and Sunday masses at St Philip Howard and her devotion was recognised when she was awarded two Medals of the Diocese.

Maureen was proactive in creating new ventures to bring people together. Also in the 1990s, she helped found the Mother Teresa Knitting Group between St Philip Howard and Linton, whose creative efforts went to support Knit for Peace. For many years she baked cakes for the benefit of the Arthur Rank Hospice and, closer to home, she was pivotal in the re-ignition of the village's Helping Hands initiative, volunteering as a driver and the coordinator until the early years of her ninth decade.

Ada Kennedy – a celebration



On 3 September, the Kennedy family held a special get-together for around 60 people to celebrate Ada's 100th birthday. For this very special occasion, her grandson and other guests came from Australia and her son Michael and wife Pam from Northern Cyrus. Her great-grandchildren, including a great grandson born just four weeks earlier, were also there.

Ada was 16 and living in London when the Second World War broke out. She tells me she wouldn't go down to the air raid shelters and preferred to hide under a table in the house. She has always had a good work ethic, working in an ammunitions factory during the war and after that at the laundry with her mother Ada.

For a better life, the family moved from London to the new town of Harlow. After bringing up her three sons – Michael, Graham and Tony – she worked at STC in Harlow soldering electronic components onto PCB boards. She retired at 60 and in the same year sadly lost her husband to a heart attack at the young age of 58. She has since lived on her own, coping with various health issues, including a double hip replacement, a heart attack and arthritis.

She lost her youngest son Tony to cancer a few years ago, which was heart-breaking for her and all of us. All of this has taken its toll but she had a wonderful day, celebrating with friends and family. She was made to feel like a queen. Pat and Graham Kennedy

Great Abington Primary School: School Year 2022–23

It has been an exciting year! It is our first year of full provision post-Covid and we have been delighted to offer the full range of events, clubs, activities and parent engagements. We have received a positive Ofsted review and established several major new educational initiatives, most notably the outdoor learning area. We are also pleased to report on a successful set of SATs results and have both welcomed and wished farewell to some staff members.

The garden

The garden area is a wonderful resource that is the envy of many schools and allows the children to acquire a wide range of learning – about the structure, lifecycle and development of plants, the process of nurturing and tending life, and nutrition, health and sustainability. Many pupils have volunteered through the Gardening Club to give their spare time in all weathers. As a place of calm, the garden is also a tonic for the pace of modern life and we have seen it have a positive impact on the wellbeing and mental health for the pupils, staff and volunteers. Special thanks go to the team that has made the garden such a success, especially the teachers who have worked hard to integrate it into the regular curriculum and the dedicated team of volunteers who have worked with the children during the school day. In the coming year we expect to develop the garden area further, embedding it more widely in the curriculum and offering more opportunities for pupils and community members to get involved.

Why we value outdoor learning

We are incredibly proud to be able to offer such a range of outdoor learning facilities, including the garden, outdoor learning area, forest school and Early Years Safari Walks. There is strong academic evidence that supports the benefits of outdoor learning in embedding key aspects of the curriculum including vocabulary and maths.

Sporting success

This year has been a great year for our school sports. The strategic decision to employ a dedicated sports coach is really paying off for our pupils, as we compete in a wide range of events across the county. We enjoy specialist coaching from The Leys School in hockey, cricket and rugby and netball. This year we were runners up in the Y5/6 County Cricket Finals and our Y3/4 team won every match they played. We were placed very highly at our athletics event and our football team once again had a successful year. Our netball and rugby teams performed in South Cambs events and demonstrated our values of respect, cooperation and responsibility.

We are one of very few schools to host three significant running events across a calendar year. Our school 1 mile run, cluster 1 mile run and the Festival of Running at Granta Park provide a wide range of running opportunities for our children and the wider community. Competing in these events develops motivation, resilience and confidence in our pupils. Our running squad took part in two external events, at Milton Country Park and Priory Park in St Neots, placing well in both events. Academic achievement

We are delighted to report that our Year Six pupils performed exceptionally well in their summer SATS. This externally validated and marked results are a culmination of the pupils' years in the primary phase and reflect on the school provision as a whole.

The results of standardised testing and teacher assessments across all the year groups show that pupils are broadly progressing in all areas of the curriculum. The tests and teacher assessments enable us to plan additional interventions and our curriculum plans for the upcoming academic year. Reflecting in the summer sun

Ukrainian Community in Abington

The 10 Ukrainians in Abington are now very comfortable living in England and need less support from the community. There is an urgent local need for accommodation for Ukrainians moving to independent living; however, there is a shortage of properties. Currently there is one guest who works at Addenbrooke's, a mother and son local to Abington, and another mother and son a few miles from the villages. When accommodation is provided the property is often unfurnished so all household items are required; again donations are welcome. One family requires a car with an automatic gearbox (budget £2000) because their new independent location does not have sufficient public transport to enable them to access their workplace.

District and County Councillors' Reports September 2023

New bin collection days

Our bin collection day has changed from Monday to Wednesday each week. This change reflects the Council's new route optimisation work and its extension of its four-day working week trial to the waste collection service. Greater Cambridge Partnership STZ update

The proposal by the Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) that we had put to us last year offered vast improvements to our public transport network, with the caveat that it would eventually need to be self-funded. This was proposed to come in the form of road-charging in Cambridge City, coming into force some time after the bus improvements. There was a very lengthy public consultation last year and the results of this have formed an updated proposal, which was published at the end of August. The GCP Assembly and Board were due to decide whether to take these new proposals forward to the next stage of the process on 28 September. A1307 works

Abington & Hildersham Women's Institute

In September Jackie Brearley, formerly an anaesthetist at Cambridge University Veterinary School, came to talk about coercion and animal abuse. Abuse is a pattern of behaviour used to gain or maintain power and control over an individual, whereas coercion is behaviour that compels an individual to act against their own will. Research shows that animal abusers are five times more likely to abuse people. In families with pets, an abuser may coerce a partner or child by threatening to harm or remove their pet. The RCVS has guidance to help vets recognise abuse in animals, e.g. non-accidental injury, Munchhausen's Syndrome. Who is the victim: the receiver or the perpetrator? Training techniques that use positive reinforcement rather than punishment lead to happier pets – and owners. After refreshments we discussed future meetings – the Committee is always pleased to receive feedback and suggestions from members. Next meeting: Monday 9 October at 7.30pm in Abington Institute with a presentation by Marion Foster on Heritage Craft and Kilting. New members and visitors are always welcome at our meetings.

Jackdaw Squatters

Like teenage boys, jackdaws do not make tidy nests. They fly in large twigs and heap them up in a rough fashion. And what better place for this than a wide windowsill (or four of them) high up in a church tower, accessible through a louvred opening (after tearing aside a feeble barrier of chicken wire with your fierce, strong beak), to lay your eggs and protect your young? Each year you pile more twigs on top until it becomes a thick layer of *almost archaeologically important* material. Nest building and raising young brings a steady shower of twigs, feathers and spiders pattering down through the beams of the bell tower onto the chamber floor beneath. But the chamber is not much visited, so it doesn't really matter (unlike the bats, who spread their offerings inside the church).

Eventually, after a decade or so, it all becomes too much for an irritated churchwarden and a cleansing op is launched. The nesting layers (by now 25 cm thick) are pushed down from the sills (a hard and dusty task) into a mighty messy heap, to be taken, in many slow and careful trips, down the narrow spiral stairs.

Note to self - renew wire netting.
