Dad came from Abington and they married in 1955. They didn't have an easy life but they were very happy and always made the best of what they had.

Mum was a real country girl and loved the outdoors, gardening and allotmenting well into her 80s. She pr

ovided the church with extremely beautiful flower arrangements when it was her turn on the rota. Now she is laid with the love of her life. Mum and Dad together for eternity.

Joan Greenham, 1930–2025

Many thanks to Karen Ellis for sending the celebrant's reading at Joan's recent funeral. Joan was born on 13 February 1930 at The Old Post Office in West Wratting. She was the youngest of five girls in a family of seven children. At the age of around four, Joan and her family moved to a



cottage next to the school house in Great Abington. The house had a big cellar and on wet days Joan loved to play down there with her brothers and sisters. They were often joined by other village children who were sent round to play while their mums got on with housework.

The family then moved into one of the newly built council houses in Church Lane, Little Abington, just before the start of the war. It was actually two houses joined into 1 to accommodate the large Thurbon family. A few years later, despite being a large family, the house also became home to two sets of evacuee children who joined them, first from Richmond and then the East End of London. Joan remained lifelong friends with one of the girls, Peggy, after her return to her family and they kept in touch by phone, letters and visits.

At the end of the war, Joan left school and went to work in a little factory in Abington at the Four Went Ways. Two years later, she met a young man while out for a walk with her little niece, Pat. He had

raging toothache and she stopped to chat with him and give him some advice for his tooth. Ted was an agricultural worker, working in the village to clear land after the war. A second meeting, a week later, revealed Ted hadn't followed Joan's instructions but that he'd taken pliers from his toolbox and pulled out the tooth himself! Joan must have been impressed by this as romance blossomed and in April 1949 the couple were married in Little Abington church and went to live in Royston. There they began their family, which over the years grew to five boys – Dicky, David, Ronald, Gerald and Peter – and finally their only girl, Karen.

Ted and Joan moved back to the family home in Abington when her father was ill and this was where they settled, Ted driving lorries up and down the country and Joan raising the children and keeping an eye on her elderly neighbours. In 1978 Joan wanted to return to work and found a part-time job in the laundry at the YMCA in Cambridge. It was a job she loved right up until she retired in 1995, after having lost Ted a few years earlier. The 1980s saw Joan and Ted enjoying holidays in their bright orange and white camper van. Each summer they would pack it full of essentials and head south for two weeks of touring. They loved meandering through the seaside towns and villages of Dorset, Devon and Cornwall, stopping whenever they found a breath-taking view where they could enjoy fish and chips or a cream tea!

In 1996, Joan moved into her little bungalow and was very happy there until a diagnosis of vascular dementia progressed, so that she was no longer able to continue living alone. After two years of being cared for by her family, Joan moved into a care home in 2023, having spent almost 90 years being an Abington girl.

District and County Councillors' Reports September 2025

Local Government Reorganisation

The process to merge District and County Councils into Unitary Authorities is proceeding. All local authorities in Cambridgeshire will have to submit their suggestions for how best they see a new local government structure working in the county. There are currently three proposals on the table: Option A:

- South Cambridgeshire, Cambridge City & East Cambridgeshire.
- Fenland, Huntingdonshire & Peterborough.

Option B:

- South Cambridgeshire & Cambridge City.
- East Cambridgeshire, Huntingdonshire, Fenland & Peterborough.

Option C:

- South Cambridgeshire, Cambridge City & Huntingdonshire.
- Fenland, Peterborough & East Cambridgeshire.

The District Council's preference is Option B, which would leave us in an administrative partnership with Cambridge City only. This is largely what currently happens, with many services already shared between the two authorities.

Ultimately, central government will make the final decision so the business cases being drawn up will be highly important to influencing this decision.

Kingsway Solar Farm

The application for a new solar farm in the vicinities of West Wratting, Weston Coville and Carlton is moving forward. The next step will be that the applicants, Kingsway Solar, will release some actual detail (not just lines drawn around fields on a map) into the public domain. This detail will then be publicly consulted via a formal consultation. This is a very important stage of the process as the responses to this will form a part of the planning application that is submitted to a planning inspector. We would strongly advise everyone to engage with this consultation, once it's open, as this potential development will affect us all in some way, regardless of proximity to the solar sites.

The formal consultation began on 17 September and will run until 29 October

Wastewater Treatment Works

You may have read in the local press that the proposed relocation of the wastewater treatment works has been cancelled by government due to the rising costs. A result of this is that the District Council now needs to find another site that can deliver circa 5000-6000 houses to ensure that the Local Plan (the housing development plan for the next 30-ish years) remains sound. The likely site that is the front-runner to replace this is Grange Farm to the north of the A1307 in Abington and adjacent to the A11. This is TBC, and dependent on lots of other factors, but is currently the local authorities' preferred site.

Greenway

The next phase of the Linton to Babraham greenway (the new-ish foot/cycle/horse path adjacent to the A1307) is to connect the path from Linton Village College to the recreation ground. This will be routed down Joiners Road to link up with the new footpath there. The engineering assessment work is currently being undertaken here with a view to commissioning the work in the coming months.

At the other end of the Greenway, the route via Abington to reach the A11 road crossing on Newmarket Road is currently re-looking at the route options for this. The original idea to route this through the village was dismissed following a public consultation. The route around Pampisford Road also has its issues, mainly due to land ownership and cost. Other options are currently being looked at by the Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP).

In September we welcomed Margaret James, author of *No Way Home: A Novelised Memoir*, a semi-autobiographical novel based on her experiences of living in Saudi Arabia in the 1980s. Her husband was appointed architect to build a settlement for the Saudi National Guard, so Maggie took a teaching post in a dysfunctional private school for Muslim expatriates. There were few teaching materials, so she relied on her ingenuity to educate her pupils. Daily life in Saudi proved to be a steep learning curve. There was no public entertainment and large gatherings were discouraged. Sometimes there were Hash Harrier events or camel races attended by the king. At weekends the family would go to the food, carpet or gold souks. (Saudi women wore their wealth in gold under their robes.) Sometimes they went with friends to the desert sandhills – great for tobogganing and kite flying but dangerous and terrifying in a storm when you can see nothing through the swirling sand and you become separated from your daughter, as happened to Maggie. Eventually the little girl was found, but a hard lesson was learnt.

A challenging quiz tested our knowledge of deserts around the world – not our best subject but I think we are all now a little wiser!

Hildersham Parish Council

Report on the meeting held on 15 September 2025

The Council employed a new grass contractor to cut the grass in August as the previous year's contractor was unable to take on the verge maintenance. It took longer than expected to find a new contractor as most were too busy to cut the grass the verges in Hildersham.

The Council is awaiting the outcome of a bid submitted for funding to improve the approach to the hazardous Back Road crossroads, which has been the location of collisions in the last few months.

The Environment Agency Coordinator for the Great Ouse, Rob Clapman, has advised the council that 'dredging the river would offer limited flood-risk benefit to the Hildersham community and could be environmentally damaging... Excess silt accumulates because the river lacks the energy to transport it downstream. Removing silt artificially creates a temporary "sink" that quickly refills and can cause destabilisation of existing bed/banks, leading to unsustainable cycle of maintenance.'

County and District Councillor Henry Batchelor recommended that local residents participate in the formal consultation for the Kingsway Solar Farm, which runs until 29 October. Your comments could influence amendments to the final plans and would be seen by the planning inspector making the decision. The solar farm would take three years to build. Cllr Batchelor advised the council to consider the likely impact on Hildersham village, as there may be mitigation.

Cllr Batchelor suggested that the building of the Grange Farm development with 5000+ houses near Little Abington was looking more likely and it would be in the new Local Plan. However, it was possibly dependent on the Babraham travel hub being built. The issue with the travel hub is that although the government will be providing funding for this project, it has now been decided that this would be in the form of a loan to the Local Council.

The next meeting of Hildersham Parish Council will be on Tuesday 11 November in Hildersham Village Hall. Information is on the Parish Council's website: hildershamparishcouncil.org.uk.
