#### From the Editor

November is synonymous with remembering. It begins with All Souls' Day, marked this year on 3 November with Services of Hope in Little Abington and Balsham (pages 20, 18), closely followed by the traditional nudge to 'remember, remember... gunpowder, treason and plot' on Guy Fawkes' Day. Remembrance Sunday, when we remember those who died in past wars and continuing conflicts around the world, falls on 9 November (page 20), while the continuing Poppy Appeal ends on 11 November. The war in Ukraine will soon be entering its fourth year and it's perhaps appropriate that this month's cover photo, taken in late September, is by a Ukrainian guest who has lived in Abington for the past three years. Saffron Walden Rotary has organised a collection for Ukraine on Saturday 8 November (page 6). The annual appeal for children and young people in care encourages us to think of them at Christmas. Please see pages 9 and 17 for ideas for suitable gifts for all ages and how to present them.

The news that the Arthur Rank Hospice is scheduled to lose several beds as a result of cuts to its funding has caused considerable concern locally. MP Pippa Heylings has started a petition in support of the hospice. Her explanation of the issue, and how to sign the petition, are on page 18.

Hildersham Church Council and Friends of Hildersham are asking for administrative support. If you have some hours to spare, please see page 5 for details.

The Christmas Fayre will be held in the Village Institute on Saturday 29 November and a programme will be arriving with this month's *News*. On that day many of us will be remembering George Woodley, Abington's Father Christmas for so many years, who died earlier this year and is much missed.

#### From the Seven Churches

The words 'Safeguarding Training' mostly elicit either blank incomprehension or a heavy sigh. Those whose work puts them in contact with children or vulnerable adults, will certainly know about these training sessions, which they must attend, often yearly. They need these safeguarding skills to help protect children and vulnerable adults from harm, abuse and neglect; skills to recognise risks and to respond appropriately when abuse is suspected. But many, rarely coming across such abuse in their work, may sigh and wonder if this isn't simply another 'tickbox' exercise.

Nevertheless, as we learn daily from the news, the effect on victims of abuse can be profoundly damaging; and the fallout for those suspected of being abusers, and for their wider circle of family and friends, can be disastrous. These aren't risks we can take lightly.

As a member of the ministry team serving our local churches, I'm also obliged to attend regular Diocesan Safeguarding Training. And to be honest, in the past I've also sighed deeply. For each year they seem to make it more and more demanding. I guess though, given the shocking record of how churches have handled (or hidden) abuse in the past, that's understandable.

Yes, the Church is rather like any other social institution. And yes, as such, reputations matter. Moreover, if we can't prove that the 'staff' are up to date with their Safeguarding Training, and all the risk assessments have been completed then, God forbid, our insurers might not pay out if there is a disaster.

Yet, much more importantly, I must not forget that our 'welcome' into these buildings and congregations is God's welcome into the Church He founded and sustains. That God has welcomed us into the safety of His love and life means that 'safeguarding' this space is no tedious nor defensive obligation, but an essential witness to God's continuing presence among us. And this year, as our annual reminder that we must all take our part in ensuring our welcome is indeed into a 'safe space', Safeguarding Sunday will be held on 16 November.

## **District and County Councillors' Reports October 2025**

#### **Local Government Reorganisation**

The process to merge District and County Councils into Unitary Authorities is proceeding. All local authorities in Cambridgeshire will have to submit their suggestions for how best they see a new local government structure working in the county. There are currently three proposals on the table: Option A:

- South Cambridgeshire, Cambridge City & East Cambridgeshire.
- Fenland, Huntingdonshire & Peterborough.

#### Option B:

- South Cambridgeshire & Cambridge City.
- East Cambridgeshire, Huntingdonshire, Fenland & Peterborough.

#### Option C:

- South Cambridgeshire, Cambridge City & Huntingdonshire.
- Fenland, Peterborough & East Cambridgeshire.

There was subsequently a late submission, spearheaded by the MPs in Peterborough, for a fourth option:

#### Option D:

• An expanded Peterborough, Fenland, East Cambridgeshire, Huntingdonshire, South Cambridgeshire & Cambridge City.

The District Council's preference is Option B, which would leave us in an administrative partnership with Cambridge City only. This is largely what currently happens, with many services already shared between the two authorities.

Ultimately, central government will make the final decision so the business cases being drawn up will be highly important to influencing this decision.

The current timeline on this is:

November 2025 – Councils need to submit their preference and the corresponding business case to government.

May 2026 – District Council elections take place, on the current local authority boundaries.

May 2027 – Elections for the new 'shadow' unitary authority take place.

May 2028 – The new unitary authorities come into power.

#### **Acorn Biodigester**

Those who have been following the progress of this planning application for an anaerobic digestion plant just outside Haverhill may recall that Suffolk County Council refused the application in June this year. The applicants, Acorn, have now indicated that they are going to appeal this decision and have instructed their planning agents to do so. We can expect this issue to resurface in the coming months. Watch this space.

## Appeal for Christmas Gifts for Children and Young People in Care plus Women's Aid in Cambridgeshire

November is a month for remembering as autumn fades and winter beckons. It is also a time for looking ahead to Christmas celebrations with family and friends. But many children and young people will be facing a very different reality where remembering is painful, filled with loss and a lack of love and security. Please will you spare a thought for all women, children and young people who have experienced suffering and trauma this year through no fault of their own. Cambridgeshire social services are looking after an increasing number of unaccompanied children escaping conflict zones in the world. We have been running this appeal for a number of years and your generosity has exceeded all expectation. Last year, we collected over 2,000 gifts for children and each gift brightened a child's or young person's life.

The young people of Hildersham Children's Church Council, in conjunction with Love Abington and the churches in Abington and Hildersham are leading this appeal. We are delighted that Biomed Realty, on Granta Park, has generously offered to join the appeal again, through their Give a Gift scheme, and we hope to collect even more donations this year so that we can offer a larger number of gifts of clothing for women and young children, toiletries and toys to Women's Aid.

Last year, you gave some thought to young people aged between 18 and 25 who are leaving care and often get forgotten at Christmas. They were immensely grateful for your thoughtfulness. If you would like to donate to this age range again, here are last year's suggestions for gifts given to us by Personal Advisors for the care leavers: chocolate, gloves, hat, scarf, football, gift card towards a sports shop purchase, art kit, blanket, backpack, toiletries, book token, notebook/journal and pen, gift card for the cinema, slippers, dressing gown. We are aware that the gift must fit people's budgets. However, if people would like to club together with friends, family or work colleagues, Social Services mentioned that young people also need second hand bicycles and repurposed tech, e.g. laptops, phones, tablets.

Please imagine what a woman who has fled her home or a child or young person of a certain age would need. Once you have bought a gift, **do not wrap it.** Please put it in a gift bag with a label on the outside saying whether it is for a boy or girl. If it is a gender-neutral present, such as colouring pencils and a sketchbook, please state 'girl or boy'.

Social Services and Biomed Realty would like to receive all the gifts by the last week in November so that they can be personally distributed in time for Christmas Day.

Please bring your gift to Creative Church in the Abington Village Institute from 9.30am on Sunday 23 November. Alternatively, please bring your gift to St Mary's Church Little Abington on Sunday 23 November between 2.00pm and 4.00pm or to Hildersham Village Hall on Monday 17 November between 3.00pm and 4.30pm and join us in all venues for tea and cake.

#### Abington & Hildersham Women's Institute

In October we were pleased to welcome several visitors for our talk by Alan Osborne about Rosalind Franklin, the Dark Lady of DNA. We knew that Francis Crick and James Watson were awarded a Nobel Prize for their discovery of the structure of DNA but learned that much of the research carried out by Rosalind was crucial. Born in London in 1920 to a Jewish family, she excelled at school, going up to Cambridge in 1938 to study chemistry, but Cambridge women were not awarded degrees at that time. In 1948 she joined British Coal – the only woman researching coal molecules and carbon crystals. Throughout her life, research teams were dominated by men. She did not make friends easily and science was her passion. In 1947 she moved to Paris working as an Xray crystallographer. She loved France but in 1951 went to work on DNA research at King's College, London with Randall and Wilkins. In 1952 Crick and Watson created a DNA model at Cavendish laboratory but this was ridiculed by other scientists. Rosalind wrote a report and produced the famous Photo 51 showing the double helix but did not publish it. Unknown to her, Wilkins showed her notes and the photo to Crick and Watson and four days later they created the DNA model. Rosalind continued her research into virus molecules in plants but became ill with cancer and died at the age of 37. The original blue plaque outside the Eagle pub credited only Crick and Watson with the discovery of DNA structure. In 2023 a new plague finally acknowledged the great contribution made by Rosalind Franklin.

### **Granta Medical Practices Update November 2025**

#### Make sure you're protected this winter

NHS Cambridgeshire & Peterborough urging anyone eligible for their COVID-19, flu, RSV or pneumococcal vaccines to make sure they've had them this winter. Each vaccine has a slightly different eligibility criteria:

- RSV vaccine for anyone who is pregnant, aged 75–79, or anyone who turned 80 years old from 1 September 2024.
- Pneumococcal vaccine for anyone 65 or over (only one dose is needed).
- Flu vaccine for anyone aged 65 or over (including those who will be 65 by 31 March 2025); have certain long-term health conditions; are pregnant; live in a care home; are the main carer for an older or disabled person or receive a carer's allowance; or live with someone who has a weakened immune system.
- COVID-19 vaccine for anyone aged 75+; those aged between six months and 74 years and have a weakened immune system because of a health condition or treatment; and people who live in a care home for older adults.

The shingles vaccine is only available to people who:

- turned 65 on or after 1 September 2023
- are aged 70 to 79
- have a severely weakened immune system.

## **Arthur Rank Hospice**

#### A message from Pippa Heylings MP

Over parliamentary recess I took the opportunity to meet and hear from residents and organisations in South Cambridgeshire. One issue has dominated – the serious funding cut facing the Arthur Rank Hospice. This wonderful organisation, which provides vital end of life care for the terminally ill, is being forced to plan for the closure of nine of its 23 beds – a reduction of 40% of its inpatient capacity. At the time of writing, the hospice is facing a funding deficit of £829,000.

Together with fellow MPs Charlotte Cane and Ian Sollom, I have set up a petition to call on the government to save these vital palliative care beds. Over 14,000 people have signed our petition calling for a rethink, with 4,500 signatures in just the first 24 hours! I have been so heartened by the extraordinary response of residents as news of this became public. This is a resounding call to action that has been well reported in the media.

Given the level of response and the concern shown, our petition is now addressed directly to the Prime Minister as well as to the Secretary of State for Health. If we can get more signatures, we plan to hand in the petition to Number 10 Downing Street – so please do sign it here www.pippaheylings.o crg.uk/campaigns/save-arh-beds and share as widely as you can to save these precious Arthur Rank Hospice beds and the skilled staff who provide the care for them.
