From the Seven Churches

Over Advent and Christmas I often revisit well-loved writings. As a child I used to perform, with my brother and sister, the poem by Clement-Clarke Moore, 'Twas the Night Before Christmas for my parents on Christmas Eve. As an adult I have enjoyed re-reading Approaching Christmas by Jane Wiiliams, a companion to the Christmas season rich in joy and wisdom, as well as a collection of poems and commentaries by Janet Morley entitled Haphazard by Starlight: A poem a day from Advent to Epiphany.

The intriguing title, *Haphazard by Starlight*, actually comes from the poem *BC–AD*, by U. A. Fanthorpe. Ursula Fanthorpe was a poet and a Quaker, who used to write a new Christmas poem each year to include with her Christmas cards to friends. They were usually short and sought a fresh, unsentimental take on the familiar story. This approach could also provide a jolt of defamiliarisation for the reader, reminding us of the extraordinary nature of the gospel truth.

As part of the Christmas carol service at Hildersham church some years ago, members of our Children's Church Council gave a reading of *BC–AD*. The poem begins with the dramatic announcement, 'This was the moment when Before/Turned into After'.

The poem then continues in a slightly meandering style with references to familiar characters from the birth narrative (the shepherds are described as 'a few farm workers' and the magi as 'three/ Members of an obscure Persian sect'). The meandering style is interrupted, however, by the jolt of the last two lines, which presents the moment those familiar characters, perhaps to their own astonishment, 'Walked haphazard by starlight straight/Into the kingdom of heaven'.

Amid all that is comfortingly familiar about Christmas, I hope we can be alert to the astonishing good news of the gospels, even if it does sometimes seem we are walking towards this truth as if 'haphazard by starlight'. For the account of Jesus' birth speaks of a moment when everything changed. A child, born in humble circumstances, is the Christ child who is greeted, as Luke's gospel says, as 'Saviour, who is the Messiah, the Lord'. Good news conveyed by these simple words, which invite a lifetime's reflection: Jesus is 'Emmanuel, which means, "God is with us". Good news worth responding to, celebrating and sharing, and which can shape the way we live in all the times and seasons of our lives.

It is important to realise that for some, Advent can stir up sadness, loneliness or memories that weigh heavily. Empty chairs at the table, financial pressures, strained relationships or simply the feeling of not being as merry as everyone else seems to be... all of these can make December feel harder than it looks from the outside. As a community, it's important we notice those who might be struggling, offer a listening ear, and remind one another that it's okay not to feel festive.

As we move towards Christmas, may the story at the heart of the season be God choosing to come close to us in love – reminding us that no one is forgotten, and no one is beyond the reach of hope.

My family and I wish you all a peaceful Advent, a joyful Christmas and moments of rest and wonder amid the busyness! With every blessing.

She loved looking through the *News*, getting her magnifying glass out to read the print and asking who the people were in the photos.

My name is Debbie McKenzie, and I am the Community Warden for the Abingtons and Hildersham.

I have worked with older people for several years in various roles, such as Meals on Wheels and as a home help. I began working for Age UK Cambridgeshire and Peterborough as a Relief Warden in 2022. My role as a Community Warden involves supporting residents of the Abingtons and Hildersham to live independently in their own homes, through daily contact (Monday to Friday). This can be a phone call or a personal visit, depending on the needs of the older person. I offer practical support like reading post, making appointments on their

behalf, light shopping and prescription collections. Of course, these are not exhaustive, as it is a multi-faceted service and is very much person-centred. Some older people just want a chat while others need help putting the bins out. No two days are the same and that's what I love about the role.

Jeremiah's Community Café



Our community run café is based in the Village Institute next to the Primary School. The café opens just twice a week at the moment: Thursdays for lunch between 12.00pm and 2.00pm and Saturday mornings 10.00am–12.00pm. We add occasional special afternoon teas and have a special Big Breakfast in December, in the run up to Christmas. Our volunteers are a dedicated band of villagers who serve

our customers with chat as well as food!

We are in need of some keen extra volunteers! Could this be you?

Training is provided and the commitment is usually about one session per month. Many prefer Thursdays or Saturdays only, and this is just fine. We did have a Friday café but that has recently been suspended until we can find some volunteers to take those sessions on. No cooking is needed at this Friday session if we can manage to staff and restart it. Cooks on the other two sessions do some online training but this is not for all volunteers – as you wish!

We have a baking group and provide cakes and scones each week. The roles on the sessions are the **cook**, who also takes overall responsibility for the session, the **server**, and the **drinks maker/washer upper**. Some volunteers prefer to stick to one role and others switch around as they wish, session by session.

We make sure large parties book ahead but mostly we have regular customers who appreciate what's on offer. This includes a bit of flexibility, as we provide outside tables for dog walkers, moving tables as customers want to sit together, or just a general welcome to the village. If you would be interested, don't be shy – we're a friendly group with experience to share and will support anyone new on the team. The training is easy and the level of commitment is up to you. We establish availability every three months, then develop a rota that suits everyone. There's no pay I'm afraid but you would be contributing to the village sense of community!

District and County Councillors' Reports November 2025

Local Plan

The District Council has recently released its draft Local Plan –the development plan for the next 30 years indicating the parcels of land in South Cambridgeshire that they feel can accommodate housing and commercial development to feed the population and economic growth during this time. The major development in our area is a site north of Abington called Grange Farm, which can accommodate up to 6,000 new houses. This would be a significant development in our area, as it would represent a new town, twice the size of Linton. This location is deemed to be 'sustainable', as it's close to employment sites like Granta Park and Babraham Research Park and is also located on major roads – the A1307 and the A11. There will be a public consultation on this proposal, plus all of the others in South Cambridgeshire, over December and January – more details to follow.

New 'Forest City'

Some people have picked up on a locally promoted 'suggestion' for a new 'Forest City' on land between Newmarket and Haverhill able to house over 1 million new people. This proposal has absolutely no legs. It's an unsolicited proposal by two unqualified individuals and carries no weight in planning terms. It's likely that they are attempting to capitalise on the government's plans to expand Cambridge but developments associated with this expansion will be properly drawn up and consulted on by an official development corporation – not this *Dragon's Den* style pitch. In our opinion, this is going nowhere.

Linton Greenway

The Linton Greenway is progressing, albeit slowly. The next section that will move forward is the section between LVC and the recreation ground in Linton. The Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) is looking to present a proposal for this route, although we understand that the only physical changes to the highway will be the widening of the footpath between LVC and Joiners Road and the stretch from the bottom of Joiners Road and the recreation ground itself. The next section of the Greenway to be completed is the section through/around Abington to link up with the A11 crossing and onwards. This route hasn't been agreed but is moving forward, slowly, so watch this space.

Cambridge South Station

The new train station being built at the Addenbrooke's site has had some construction delays and now won't open until June 2026.

Parish Councils Amalgamation – survey deadline

Phase 2 of the consultation on the proposal to create a new Parish Council covering the combined area of Great Abington and Little Abington is now being conducted by South Cambs District Council. The planned "Community Governance Review" could group the present two Parish Councils under a single governing body, while each parish will retain its individual identity.

It is important that all Abington residents take part in the survey and hence have a say in the decision-making process. You can take part in the survey online at www.scambs.gov.uk/community-governance-reviews or complete a paper copy of the survey available from the Village Shop or the Village Institute. The survey closes at midnight on 18 December 2025.

River Project Update

Our river Granta is a local chalk stream that is important for wildlife and people. There are only about 200 chalk streams in the world and 85% of them are in England, indicating their importance. Last year Cambridge City Council put together the Greater Cambridge Stream Partnership, which plans to improve five local chalk streams and the Granta in Abington was one of the sites chosen. Money has been obtained and plans have been worked up and consulted on locally. There are two aspects to the project. The first is to carry out regular monitoring of the water in the river to check the quality of the water and test for any pollution of the water flowing through Abington. This will be carried out by a group of volunteers and is due to start soon. The next step is to improve the state of the river along the cricket and recreation fields with some work in the river and along the banks. This aspect of the plan is waiting for final approval from the Environment Agency and is scheduled to start next spring, when ground conditions are better.
