Last month, full details were provided of a proposal for a substantial new development on land to the north of the villages, between the A1307 (Cambridge Road) and the A11. In brief, the plan is for a town three times the size of Linton, involving high-density housing and the infrastructure needed to support it. On page 8, there is a report of the Q&A session organised by Greater Cambridge Planning (GCP) at the Village Institute on 14 January. This meeting attracted so many that a large number of people could not be admitted. In recognition of this, GCP has organised a second meeting at the Institute on 28 January, while the consultation period remains open until 30 January. Please read the report for details about how to comment on the proposal, should you wish to do so.

Elsewhere this month, there are tributes to much-loved and missed members of the community (pages 5 and 15). From the Seven Churches

February often feels like a turning point. Winter still clings on, yet the days are unmistakably lengthening. Snowdrops push through the cold ground, if they haven't already! Lambing season begins, and there is a sense – however fragile – that spring is on its way.

In the Church, February holds that same sense of transition and invitation. Early in the month we celebrate Candlemas, marking the presentation of the infant Jesus in the Temple. It is a festival of light. Candles are lit to remind us that light has come into the world – quietly, vulnerably and with hope. Candlemas asks us where we see light today: in kindness offered, in community strengthened, in perseverance through difficult times. Holding on to the fact and knowing that even the smallest flame can make a difference in dark places.

Later in the month comes Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent. It is a very different kind of moment, quieter, more reflective. Palm leaf ashes are used to mark the sign of the cross on foreheads, accompanied by words that remind us of our humanity and our need for God. It may sound stark but it is deeply honest. Lent, as always, invites us to pause, to reflect and to ask what really matters within our lives.

Lent can often be misunderstood, seen as a season of gloomy self-denial. In fact, it is about making space – letting go of what distracts or drains us so that something new can grow. Some people give something up; others take something on: more rest time, more prayer, more generosity, more care for neighbours and the environment. At its heart, Lent is a journey towards renewal.

Across our villages, February is a month of quiet faithfulness: schools, shops, cafés, farms, community groups, volunteers and neighbours simply getting on with caring for one another. The Church's seasons mirror this rhythm of everyday life – light offered, honesty faced and hope nurtured.

As we move through February and into Lent, may we each find moments of light, courage for reflection and signs of new life already stirring among us.

Julie's hallmark was her kindness to others – and her work with children needing additional support at Abington Primary and Linton Village College meant she had an impact on many young lives in the village and wider area.

The whole family were very touched by the messages we received during her illness and subsequently.

Grange Farm – Public Meeting Attracts a Full House

Village residents packed the Institute on the evening of 14 January to question representatives of the Greater Cambridge Planning department on their proposal for a 6,000-dwelling settlement on the Grange Farm site, just over the A1307 from Little Abington. Our local councillors John and Henry Batchelor also attended but our MP Pippa Heylings was not able to accept our invitation.

The Institute Main Hall, Terrace and Foyer were all full to permitted capacity and unfortunately some 80 residents had to be turned away. (Apologies that the PA system did not reach the Terrace and Foyer adequately.) Because so many could not be admitted, Greater Cambridge Planning booked the Village Institute for a second similar public meeting (6.30pm on 28 January) before the end of the consultation period.

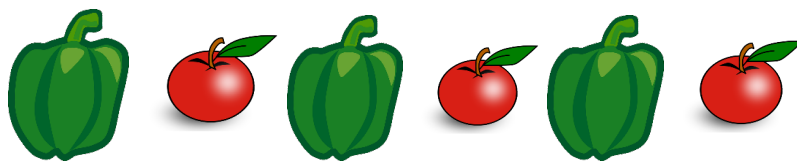
The meeting began with a presentation by Jonathan Dixon, Planning Policy Manager, on the rationale for the Grange Farm scheme, then he and Stephen Kelly, Director for Planning, responded to questions. Thanks are due to a great effort by Village Consultation, a group of residents, who had invited pre-submission of questions that they consolidated and prioritised to ensure that key questions were asked first under a series of headings. These were followed by further questions from the audience.

The Planners were left in no doubt that the audience was united in opposition to the scheme and unconvinced by the reasons given for it. There were also widespread doubts expressed regarding the proposed solutions to a range of relevant issues – preserving the landscape and environment; water, sewage and drainage; protecting the chalk aquifer and the river Granta; and transport and traffic.

All residents are urged to submit their individual comments to the consultation on the Greater Cambridge Shared Planning website (Reference 'Policy S/GF: Land adjacent to A11 and A1307 at Grange Farm'), which is open until 5.00pm on 30 January. This is the best and official way to lodge a comment, but if this proves too daunting, an alternative is via localplan@greatercambridgeplanning.org.

At the close of the meeting Tony Orgee, Chair, Great Abington Parish Council, outlined the further stages of the planning process.

District and County Councillors' Reports January 2026

Local Government Reorganisation

Following the submission to central government by local authorities in Cambridgeshire of their preferred geographic splits of what new unitary authorities would look like, we now wait until the government has digested this information. We will likely be asked for further thoughts, via a consultation, once government has whittled the possibilities down to what they think are the most efficient/realistic. More to follow in the coming months.

Kingsway Solar

Thank you to all those who engaged with the public consultation last year. It was very important to get people's comments into Kingsway, as these will all be sent to the planning inspector who will be making the decision on this proposal.

A small update on national planning policy, which is relevant to Nationally Significant Infrastructure Proposals (NSIPs), of which the Kingsway Solar Farm is one. Recently, the government has changed planning laws to make the NSIP process quicker. Whether this is a good thing or not has yet to be seen but could be interpreted as speeding up delivery at the expense of scrutiny. The main changes are:

- Accelerating infrastructure, in particular NSIPs.
- Limiting the number of attempts at legal challenge against government decisions on major infrastructure projects.
- Development corporations: will be focused on new towns and large-scale development. The key element to note is that the Act gives them transport powers.
- Strategic planning: Spatial Development Strategies (SDS) become a statutory requirement for combined authorities/mayoral strategic authorities.
- A more strategic approach to nature recovery.
- Changes to the compulsory purchase order (CPO) process and land compensation rules to enable more effective land assembly through public sector-led schemes.

Weekly Food Waste Collection

The changes to how our food waste will be collected will be implemented this year. Every household will receive a separate food caddy for all their food waste, which will be collected by the District Council in the same way that our bins currently are.

This change has been made in response to DEFRA changing the law around how food can be disposed of, so locally we need to collect it separately from the waste in other bins, specifically the green bin. Abington & Hildersham Women's Institute

Our New Year Meeting began with a talk about a little-known charity, Hearing Dogs for Deaf People, by Angela Saunders, who became deaf at the age of five, and her lovely Labrador, Dory. The charity was set up by Ben Fogle's father in 1982. Hearing loss at any age can lead to anxiety, depression and isolation, affecting every aspect of someone's life, from their independence and relationships to their sense of safety and mental health. Puppies (usually Labradors, Cocker Spaniels or Cockerpoos) are specially trained up to the age of two to recognise and alert their handlers to everyday sounds (phones, alarms, kettles, bells, machinery) by nudging them. Hearing dogs meet their potential deaf owner for a week at the training centre and if all goes well, they support each other until they retire aged 11. The dogs give their owners not only assistance but also confidence and companionship and can be recognised in the street by their burgundy jackets. Angela taught us the signing alphabet and urged us to seek help for any hearing loss – modern aids cannot cure deafness but can make life much more enjoyable.

Following refreshments, we discussed the future of our WI. After more years than I can remember, the current long-serving committee members will resign at the AGM in March. If no-one else is elected, Abington & Hildersham WI will be suspended and sadly we will cease to meet.

Next meeting: Monday 9 February 7.30pm in the Village Institute. Joan Graham will lead us in a session of chair yoga. Visitors and new members always welcome.

New food waste caddies

Greater Cambridge Shared Waste is rolling out a new food waste collection. Households will be notified when food caddies will be delivered – one for the kitchen and the other to be placed outside each week with the bin. The new service is part of national legislation to collect food waste separately, aims to boost recycling rates and reduce the amount of food that ends up in landfill.

Hildersham Parish Council

Meeting held on 13 January 2026

The Council has made another bid for funding to improve the approach to the hazardous Back Road crossroads. David Mercer was thanked for his persistence in trying to get funding for these much-needed changes.

County and District Councillors, Henry and John Batchelor, explained that the new unitary authority was scheduled to be in place by April 2028. The government would decide on the structure of the new authority and consult on it locally with the aim of making a final decision in July 2026. Elections are currently planned to take place in May 2026 and in 2027.

The proposed Grange Farm Settlement (for 6,000 homes), located near the A11 roundabout and opposite Little Abington, has been included in the Draft Local Plan. A public meeting, attended by representatives of the Planning Department, was held on 14 January.

The Council selected a new grass contractor to cut the grass in 2026, having received a positive reference from a local parish council that has used them for years. The grass cutting for 2026 should be more satisfactory than last year.

The council has ordered a commemorative blossom tree and plaque to honour the community volunteers and remember those affected by the Covid-19 pandemic. A day of national reflection will take place on Sunday 8 March. The tree is to be planted in the play area around the same time.

The Recreation Ground Trust and Field Garden Trust meetings are held after each Parish Council meeting. The land previously administered by the Parish Council, including the allotments, the Recreation Ground, North and South Holding are managed by the Trust.
